LOOKING BACK

Introducing - my Grandma Davis. Her maiden name was Catherine Hocgencamp; her ancestors were Dutch. She was one of the most loving people I ever knew.

In the early 1920's my Dad passed away and I started working at the Hotel Sherwood in Livingston Manor. Grandma lived within walking distance of the hotel. My cousin Wallace Davis lived with her, but most evenings he visited the pool hall, leaving Grandma to spend her evenings alone. Realizing she might be lonely, I would walk up to her house after work. I usually found her sitting close to her kerosene lamp sewing away on the patchwork quilts she made her living by. In earlier years she had earned her living making rag carpets. She had her own spinning wheel and loom.

I'll always remember, sitting there beside her in the lamplight, how patiently she tried to teach me how to piece a simple nine block. "Keep your stitches close and even," she would say as my stitches laid unevenly at the margin of each square. While her stitches were tiny and dainty, mine seemed a yard long. As we sat there sewing she told me she was saving the little snips of material from the quilts she was working on, planning to some day make a quilt for each of her grandchildren as a remembrance of her; but I could do my own now with her help. Of course I thought it an excellent idea. So she brought out some odds and ends of material she had saved over the years for my quilt. A few I recog-nized were tiny pieces from my own dresses as a child. As we stitched away she told me many stories and answered many questions I had often wondered about but never had the courage to ask.

That old quilt is patched and faded now. It has seen much better days, but I plan on leaving it to my children and grandchildren; but before I do I'll show them the block with my dress material as a child, and Grandma's apron material block she made special for that quilt.

Grandma has been gone years and years now, but my memories of her are as vivid as my yardlong stitches are in that old worn-out quilt.

Household Hint:

Time to get out the Sneakers -Keep Them from Smelling

Utterly Delectable Leek

The leek are just starting to poke their way out of the still cold soil and last fall's decaying leaves.

Leek have broad, smooth, light green leaves, often with deep purple or burgundy tints on the lower stems that begin to make themselves known in small troops as soon as the snow disappears. They have scallion like

bulbs that are strongly rooted just beneath the surface of the soil. If you tear a leaf or stem and take a sniff you will recognize the strong and distinctive onion/garlic-like scent of the Wild Leek.

This herbaceous perennial plant produces basal leaves 4-9" long and 1 1/2 -3 1/2" across on short petioles (leaf stalks that joins two or three leaves to the stem). The basa leaves are ovate-oval to ovate-



elliptic, light to medium green, hairless, and smooth along the margins. Their petioles are reddish, hairless, and wrapped in a basal sheath below. The leaves develop during the spring and wither away by early summer.

During early to mid-summer, a flowering stalk about 1/2-1 1/2' tall develops. This stalk is cylindrical and slightly tapered, smooth, and reddish to pale green; at its base, there is a papery sheath. The stalk terminates in a single rounded umbel (flower cluster) o flowers spanning 1-2" across; there are typically 20-40 flowers per umbel. At the base of this umbel, there is a pair of deciduous bracts. Each flower is about 1/4" across, consisting of 6 white to translucent white tepals (a segment of the outer whorl in a flower that has no differentiation between petals and sepals), a light green to pale yellow ovary, 6 stamens with pale yellow anthers, and a single white style. At the base of each flower, there is a slender pedicel that is white to greenish white. period occurs during the summer and lasts about 2 weeks. Both the flowers and foliage exude an onion-like odor. After the blooming period, the ovary of each flower matures into a 3-celled seed capsule; each cell contains a single globoid seed that becomes black at maturity. The root system consists of an ovoid bulb with fibrous roots at its base. Offsets often develop, producing clonal colonies of plants. They like rich, moist, loose soil high in organic matter and low in pH, which makes mountain hardwood forests perfect.

Ramps grow in small sparsely populated patches up to densely populated areas of several acres. They are usually ready to harvest by late March through April depending on the region and only last a month or so before wilting and disappearing. It is extremely important to think conservatively when considering ramp harvest. In many areas where ramps were once abundant they are now rare and populations continue to be decimated by over-harvesting for ramp festivals, fundraisers, farmers market sales and by individuals who gather as much as they can for their own use.

Please be gentle and use good judgment. The most sustainable way to harvest ramps is by using a knife to gently move the soil from one side of the bulb. Then, taking care not to dislodge the bulb and roots, cut the base off of the bulb leaving it with the roots in the ground. This will ensure new ramps will grow the following season.

Better yet, just harvest the leaves when the you see that a patch is not heavily populated. The leaves provide lavish greens for any salad. Their delicate flavor surpasses even that of scallions or chives. This charming woodland herb should not be underestimated. The entire plant is more than simply edible: it is utterly delectable!




Prayer Mysterious Book Report No. 191

Across the world today, debates are raging between believers and non-believers about the existence of God, and the power of prayer. Radicals are trying to establish theocracies where everyone will adhere to strict religious law, as in Iran, where there's no separation between church and State, because the church is the government. It's where religious authority figures interpret the words of God as written down by the prophet Mohammed and pass them on to the ordinary folk . . . who follow without hesitation. And hey, don't worry-this isn't a religious sermon-far from it in fact.



One of my favorite authors has written a pulse-quickening new thriller about an FBI agent in Houston, Texas who is wrestling with this self-same dilemma. *Prayer*, (Putnam/Penguin, \$26.95, 409 pages, ISBN 978-0-399-16765-2) by Phillip Kerr, begins with FBI Domestic Terrorism Agent Gil Martins discovering that he has played a key role in wrongly convicting a man, and condemning him to death row. Up to that point in his career, he has always thought of himself as one of the good guys who are part of the solution, not part of the problem. But the wrongful conviction shakes him to the core, causing him to have doubts about himself, his career, his marriage . . . even his belief and faith in God. As he is losing his faith however, his wife is reaffirming hers and their relationship starts to fall apart . . . just



as a vicious serial killer begins targeting the morally righteous in and around Houston for what appears to be religious reasons, and the case goes from homicide to domestic terrorism. Confronted with what seems illogical, bordering even on supernatural acts, Martins offers up a simple prayer asking for proof that God exists. When no response comes he loses his faith altogether, becomes estranged from his wife and doubts in his ability to bring justice to the world. But he soon learns that you should be careful what you pray for . . . your answer may come in an unexpected way, at the risk of that which you hold most dear . . . from a far different deity than you thought you knew. Those who read this pulse-pounding thriller will find themselves thinking about it long after they're through reading, because the conclusion is not only exciting -it's downright astonishing! See for yourself why Phillip Kerr is one of our favorite new authors.

I am writing this on Earth Day, but that is just coincidental. Spring clean-up starts the moment you know it is spring. Perhaps it is the snow drops or crocus poking through or just that first day you shed your winter jacket and venture outside to see green of spring replacing

the gray and brown of winter.

We are fortunate to live in the woods, so formal gardens and lawns are a thing of the past. Aside from three little flower patches near the

Aside from three little flower patches near the deck, everything else that grows is the result of what I call "Random Gardening." Random gardening is an approach of burying perennials in

my rocky soil and leaving them to fend for themselves. It is truly a Darwinian experiment to see the survival of the fittest and the will to propagate.

A walk in the woods on a path that emerges from footprints, not design, might show a patch of "crazies",

chrysanthemum/daisy that my neighbor Linda gave me years ago. A little turn reveals some forsythia bushes that were merely broken-off sticks from the farmhouse below.

A little further is a flowering fig tree from my friend Monica and a rhododendron and azalea bush from my friend JoAnne. Lilacs from Judy Rank grow here and there. A patch of mountain laurel and array of wild herbs and flowers grow wherever they choose.

We do not rake leaves. My husband blows them further into the woods to become fertile soil for whatever Mother Nature chooses to sow there.

So spring cleaning isn't a list of chores to be done. Instead it is a tribute to the end of winter. Here is the abbreviated list of things to do:

Call the window washer to brighten my thirty-seven windows that are sooty from the wood stove. (Who did I think would wash the two-story picture windows and many sky lights?)

Put the lounger on the deck to read a book on a balmy day.

Plant pansies in the pots on the deck.

Move hardy house plants outside.

Open some windows and sky-lights.

Wash my winter coats, hats, and mittens. (I no longer dry-clean anything. My apparel is wash and wear or it goes to the clothing collection bin.)

Buy and prepare lots of asparagus for dinner. I used to grow it on the farm.

Spring is meant to be a re-birth. It is an invitation to get outdoors and enjoy it, not try to tame it. I live comfortably with Mother Nature. Over the years, I learned that in a competition of tidying and controlling the outdoors, she always wins. She is my haphazard gardening buddy, not an adversary.



UC Executive Jen Metzger and Hudson Valley County Executives Demand that Holtec Abandon Plan to Dump Radioactive Water In Hudson

Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger stood on the banks of the Hudson River, flanked by leading environmentalists and County Executives from Westchester, Rockland, Putnam, and Orange Counties, to declare that the pause on the May planned release of treated wastewater from Indian Point Energy Center into the Hudson River isn't enough. The County Executives demanded that Holtec abandon any planned dump of the radioactive water into the river and launch a transparent and thorough review, including hearing from local residents and officials, on how best to deal with contaminated wastewater at the plant.

Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger said, "We will not stand by in the face of threats to the health of the Hudson River and to our communities. We have been fighting corporate polluters for too many decades, and have long since rejected the notion that this vital and irreplaceable resource can be a dumping ground for hazardous waste of any kind. The pause in Holtec's plan is a welcome reprieve, but we need a different solution altogether, and I am calling for secure storage of the contaminated water on the Indian Point site while safer disposal methods are evaluated."

Westchester County Executive George Latimer said: "Holtec heard the clear call by all concerned parties to stop the plan to dump Indian Point wastewater into the majestic Hudson River - but this battle is far from over. We need a plan for this radioactive wastewater from Indian Point, and we need the plan to protect the health of the people who call the Hudson Valley home. We also need good faith commitment from Holtec to have discussions about the plan transparently and forthcoming. Decisions need to be made considering the welfare of the residents and the environment - not just Holtec's bottom line."

As the situation continues to develop, the County Executives remain committed to advocating for the safety and well-being of local communities and the environment.







DEC and OGS Announce First-Ever Participants of New York State's Green Purchasing Communities Program

Local Governments Commit to Purchasing More Sustainable Products and Accelerate Shift to A Green Economy All Local Governments are Encouraged to Participate

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and Office of General Services (OGS) today announced the first members of the State's newly launched Green Purchasing Communities program. This announcement, made during New York State's Earth Week celebration, acknowledges the city of White Plains and village of Croton-on-Hudson in Westchester County and the village of Pulaski in Oswego County for making commitments to purchase more sustainable products and support a more sustainable economy.

"Governor Kathy Hochul's ambitious green procurement initiatives are advancing a more sustainable future for New York by involving local governments through the State's new Green Purchasing Communities program," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "I encourage communities across the state to follow the lead of White Plains, Croton-on-Hudson, and Pulaski and become members of the program for the benefit of our environment and to support New York's ongoing green economic growth."

"Under Governor Hochul's leadership, New York State is providing our partners in local government with an easy and effective way to adopt sustainable purchasing practices," OGS Commissioner Jeanette Moy said. "OGS applauds the communities that have become members of the Green Purchasing Communities program, and we urge others to join them and the State in supporting the green economy and creating a healthier environment for all."

Created in 2008 and continued in 2022 by Governor Hochul's Executive Order 22, New York State's green procurement program features 89 green procurement specifications that agencies and authorities follow to ensure that State dollars are invested in products that have a lower environmental impact. These specifications are helping New York to meet its greenhouse gas reduction and other environmental goals by ensuring products purchased use less energy, generate less waste, and reduce exposure to hazardous substances. To build on these

actions, the Governor launched the Green Purchasing Communities Program in December 2022. Administered by DEC and OGS, Green Purchasing Communities simplifies the green purchasing process for local governments and recognizes municipalities for committing to following the State's GreenNY purchasing specifications.

To become members of the program, governing boards of participating local governments add language to municipal purchasing policies stating that they will follow the State's 89 GreenNY Procurement Specifications. This makes it easier for participants to identify and purchase more sustainable products and services. The three initial members announced today represent an annual \$24.1 million in spending on goods and services that will now be more sustainable by following the GreenNY specifications.


Any local government in New York State is eligible to participate in the program and can do so by taking two steps:

Update their purchasing policy to require purchasers to follow the State's GreenNY procurement specifications; and

Submit a copy of the updated purchasing policy along with the one-page application.

Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger Advances New County Climate Initiatives for Earth Day

KINGSTON, NY - On the eve of Earth Day, Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger announced actions aligned with key directives of her Climate Executive Order issued in January. These include proposals to strengthen the County's green fleet and green purchasing policies, both of which will require legislative approval, and a new Ulster County Climate Corps

internship program to give young people hands-on experience in developing climate policies and programs.

"I am thrilled to announce these important steps forward in County efforts to tackle the climate crisis and protect the environment for future generations," said Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger. "These updates to the County's laws governing green fleet and green purchasing policies will help us reduce climate-damaging emissions and save taxpayer dollars, while our new Ulster County Climate Corps internship program will provide valuable opportunities for young people to gain job skills and experience while positively contributing to our communities."

Metzger added, "As we mark Earth Day this week, I am excited to continue the work in partnership with the Legislature

to build a more sustainable, resilient, and thriving Ulster County that leaves no one behind."

The proposed updates to the green fleet policy will accelerate the electrification of the County's passenger vehicle fleet by requiring new County vehicle purchases to be zero-emissions beginning in 2025, ten years ahead of New York State's mandate that all vehicles sold in New York are to be zero emissions by 2035. This policy would be a major step forward in the County's efforts to reduce its carbon footprint and combat climate change, and would also reduce operational costs through savings on fuel costs and maintenance.

County Executive Metzger also announced proposed amendments to the County's green purchasing policy aimed at reducing waste and greenhouse gas emissions while growing the market for recycled materials. Among the new provisions

are a requirement for 100% recycled content for all County office paper purchases and a prohibition on purchasing single-use food and beverage plastics for County government uses. The policy update also includes model language from the New York State Office of General Services that qualifies Ulster County to become a certified Green Purchasing Community.

"By prioritizing the purchase of environmentally-responsible products and services, we are not only reducing waste and shrinking our carbon footprint but also growing the market for green alternatives that will create jobs," said Ulster

County Executive Jen Metzger.

In addition to the new green fleet and green purchasing policies, Ulster County is launching the Ulster County Climate Corps - a paid, project-based summer internship Participants will be assigned to various County departments to help implement the County government's climate and sustainability initiatives. Projects will be aligned with the New York State Climate Smart Communities program actions as well as County Executive Metzger's Executive Order to meet the goals of the NYS Climate Act. The projects will focus on areas such as energy efficiency, renewable energy, and sustainable transportation.

This internship program is part of a broader effort to recruit and cultivate the next generation for green careers and public service, reflecting the talents and diversity of our community. Interns will gain professional and practical experience in government, supplemented by skill-based training and guest speakers on topics related to the environment, project management, and public administration. Interns will also have opportunities to participate in community engagement and fieldwork.

Governor Hochul Announces Kickoff of Bear Mountain Bridge Centennial Celebrations Iconic Hudson Valley Suspension Bridge Will Celebrate 100 Years in 2024

Time Capsule Dedicated to Celebrate Construction Starting in 1923


Governor Kathy Hochul today announced the kickoff of celebrations surrounding the upcoming centennial of the Bear Mountain Bridge in 2024. Between now and fall 2024, several events and initiatives are underway to celebrate one of the Hudson Valley's most recognizable structures, including a centennial website, a documentary film and an international bridge engineering conference. Various leaders and community members joined the New York State Bridge Authority at the bridge today to make the announcement. Participants also dedicated a time capsule to mark 100 years since construction of the bridge began.

"New York has a long history of creating worldclass infrastructure that has transformed our state -a legacy that continues to this day," Governor Hochul said. "As we begin to commemorate the centennial of the Bear Mountain Bridge, I hope residents and visitors alike continue to appreciate the importance of this beloved Hudson Valley fixture."

Lieutenant Governor Antonio Delgado said, "The Bear Mountain Bridge has stood for generations, providing a gateway to some of the best outdoor recreation in the Northeast and serving as a vital route for locals and tourists alike. As we mark its centennial, let us remember our fellow New Yorkers - past, present, and future - who dream big, who build our communities, who do the impossible, and who make this place live up to its nickname of 'The Empire State.'"

The Bear Mountain Bridge was dedicated on November 26, 1924. It was a groundbreaking engineering achievement for its time, being the first vehicular bridge over the Hudson River south of Albany and the first suspension bridge with a concrete deck. For a brief period, it also held the title of "bridge with the longest suspended central span in the world." Many consider the innovations with the Bear Mountain Bridge to have spurred a boom in bridge building in New York State and the entire country in the years following.

The bridge was originally built by a private enterprise, the Bear Mountain Hudson River Bridge Company, which had connections with the prominent Harriman family who helped preserve Bear Mountain State Park and other nearby public lands. Construction began in spring 1923 and lasted 20 months, without a single loss of life. Once opened,



the bridge offered users of the increasingly popular automobile a more direct connection to the nearby state park.

At the time the bridge opened in 1924, the roundtrip toll for a passenger car was \$1.60, with surcharges for passengers. Starting May 1, 2023, the roundtrip toll will be \$1.65 for E-ZPass drivers and \$2.15 for Tolls by Mail customers, regardless of the number of passengers.

In September 1940, the New York State Bridge Authority (NYSBA) acquired the bridge, which is currently NYSBA's southernmost bridge. In 2018, the bridge received the ceremonial designation of "Purple Heart Veterans Memorial" Bear Mountain Bridge, in honor of Purple Heart recipients and in recognition of the area's rich military history.

The bridge is situated at the junction of four counties: Orange and Rockland on the west side of the river and Westchester and Putnam on the east side. In addition to serving over 7 million vehicles a year, the bridge is also the Hudson River crossing point for the Appalachian Trail, a national hiking route that traverses over 2,000 miles between Maine and Georgia.

New York State Bridge Authority Executive Director Dr. Minosca Alcantara said, "A century after it was first constructed, the Bear Mountain Bridge continues to stand proudly over the Hudson River thanks to the Bridge Authority's preventive maintenance program. At the end of the day, this centennial is a celebration of the hardworking men and women who have built, maintained, and protected this bridge so that it can enter a new century of service to the Hudson Valley." Assemblywoman Dana Levenberg said, "I am pleased to be able to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Bear Mountain Bridge with contributions to this very special time capsule. My predecessor, Assemblywoman Sandy Galef, sponsored the law that designated this bridge the Purple Heart Veterans Memorial Bear Mountain Bridge, acknowledging the importance of Purple Heart Veterans and the bridge itself to this region. With appropriate funding and care, I hope this bridge remains in operation for many more years to come."

Rockland County Executive Ed Day said, "I am delighted to be here today for the time capsule dedication as we gear up to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the construction of the Bear Mountain Bridge that connects the Hudson Valley region. The latest issue of the Rockland County Travel Guide will be included in the capsule, and it will be exciting to see how our area has evolved in another 100 years from now. On behalf of all Rocklanders, Rockland County is proud to be a part of this special historical moment in time."

Time Capsule Dedication

Today at the bridge, NYSBA leadership joined other state agencies, elected officials, and community members to dedicate a time capsule in honor of 100 years since construction of the bridge started. A number of items were contributed to the capsule, including letters from Governor Hochul and Lieutenant Governor Delgado, artifacts related to the Harriman family, written memories of the bridge, and various mementos from the Bridge Authority and the Hudson Valley region. Also included are letters to the future written by 4th grade students at Hillcrest Elementary School in Peekskill.

The time capsule was sealed by NYSBA's longest-serving employee, John Brooks. A resident of Ulster County, Mr. Brooks first worked as a toll collector at the Mid-Hudson Bridge starting in September 1966. Since retiring from full-time service in 1997, Mr. Brooks has stayed on as a part-time employee at NYSBA headquarters in Highland, NY, dedicating over 56 years of service to the Authority.

The time capsule will be mounted in the bridge's west anchorage and will be reopened 100 years from now in April 2123. The space is located in the basement of the bridge's historic administration building and is home to the Richy Vacek Bear Mountain Bridge Museum. The space, named in memory of a retired bridge foreman, is home to a small museum and classroom area that is open to schools and other groups by appointment.

New Centennial Website Launched

The Bridge Authority has launched a new website dedicated to the 100th anniversary of the bridge: www.bmb100.com. Visitors there can access information about centennial-related events, share memories, and view archival materials. Most notably, film footage of the construction of the bridge taken in October 1924 is being featured on the website, thanks to the preservation efforts of the Moving Image Research Collection at the University of South Carolina.

Further details about the centennial-related events will be posted on the website as they become available.

Documentary Film Under Development

A documentary film, expected to be about one hour in duration, is also under development. The film project is a collaborative effort between the Bridge Authority, the nonprofit Historic Bridges of the Hudson Valley and local videographer Scott Snell of SDS Imagery.

International Engineering Conference Coming to the Hudson Valley

The Hudson Valley has been selected as the location for the 2024 conference for the International Cable Supported Bridge Operators Association (ICSBOA). The 12th edition of the conference is set to take place from October 6-10, 2024, at the United States Military Academy at West Point. It is expected to bring together engineers and bridge operators from around the world and will showcase the Bear Mountain Bridge during its centennial year.

ICSBOA focuses on helping its members maintain and sustain cable supported bridge infrastructure by sharing insights and expertise in operations and preventive maintenance. Cable supported bridges include suspension bridges like NYSBA's Bear Mountain Bridge and Mid-Hudson Bridge. The main forum for the exchange of best practices is through the International Cable Supported Bridge Operators Conference (ICSBOC), which is held every two to three years at locations around the world. The most recent ICSBOC took place in November 2022 in Kobe, Japan.

The conference has particular significance for NYSBA and the Hudson Valley. While ICSBOA was formally established as an organization in 2013, its gatherings date back to 1991, when NYSBA brought together over 100 engineers and bridge owners to Poughkeepsie, NY to discuss ways to strengthen suspension cables on the Mid-Hudson Bridge and other cable supported bridges. A second conference was held in 2000 centered around the Bear Mountain Bridge, followed by subsequent conferences held at rotating locations around the world every two or three years.

About the New York State Bridge Authority

The New York State Bridge Authority operates the Bear Mountain, Newburgh-Beacon, Mid-Hudson, Kingston-Rhinecliff and Rip Van Winkle Bridges. It also owns and maintains the structure of the Walkway Over the Hudson pedestrian bridge. The Authority receives no operating funding through state or federal tax dollars, with nearly all of its revenue coming through tolls. Tolls are reinvested back into capital improvements on the Authority's spans, ensuring these critical pieces of infrastructure can continue serving the Hudson Valley for decades to come.

Governor Hochul Announces more than \$1.68 Million in Grants Through New York State's Securing Reproductive Health Centers Program

o Funding Will Allow 20 Healthcare Networks and Nonprofit Organizations to Improve Security for Patients and Staff at 51 Locations Statewide

o Each Facility Will Receive Up to \$50,000 to Help Ensure Safe Access to Services

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced more than \$1.68 million in grants through New York State's Securing Reproductive Health Centers Program, which will allow 20 healthcare networks and nonprofit organizations to improve security for patients and staff at 51 locations they operate statewide. Each facility will receive up to \$50,000 to help ensure safe access to reproductive health and abortion services. New York State established the grant program following the U.S. Supreme Court's 2022 decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization.

"Women deserve to be able to make their own choices about their bodies, informed with reliable health care guidance," Governor Hochul said. "These grants will help protect abortion access and ensure providers may continue to deliver critical services to those in need. As extremists in the courts and in other states continue their attack on our rights, New York will always fight to support providers and all patients who need care."

"We refuse to roll back the clock on reproductive freedoms in New York," said Lieutenant Governor Delgado. "With these grants, we can ensure healthcare networks and nonprofit organizations can continue to provide safe and accessible abortion services. This state will remain a safe haven for anyone seeking the full range of reproductive healthcare options they need and deserve."

The Securing Reproductive Health Centers Program is one component of Governor Hochul's comprehensive plan to further preserve, protect and strengthen reproductive rights and abortion access following the Dobbs decision, which overturned the protections that were established by Roe v. Wade and had existed for 50 years. Public, nonprofit and private providers were eligible to seek funding administered by the state Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) to train security personnel and staff, and for projects including, but not limited to, perimeter lighting; alarm, public address; and lock-down systems; cameras, door hardening, locking and other access control improvements; and shatter-resistant windows and glass. The 20 grantees will receive a total of \$1,686,786.66 for security enhancements and improvements at 51 facilities.

Division of Criminal Justice Services Commissioner Rossana Rosado said, "The Division of Criminal Justice Services is committed to a safe and just New York. With Governor Hochul's support, we are proud to help secure reproductive health centers and protect practitioners, staff, and people seeking care. We are grateful for these essential providers who are all too often on the front line of a national fight that should be long behind us. Thank you, Governor Hochul, for your unwavering leadership on public safety and women's rights."

New York State also has a comprehensive website that provide a single destination for information about abortion rights, providers, supports, and payment options, and a nation-leading \$25 million dollar Abortion Provider Support Fund, administered by the state Department of Health (DOH), to expand capacity and ensure access for patients seeking abortion care in New York.

Department of Health Acting Commissioner Dr. James

McDonald said, "We are doing everything we can to make sure abortion remains safe, legal, and accessible in New York State, despite what has happened in the federal courts. This investment by the Governor will help keep providers safe and secure as they work to meet the healthcare needs of individuals seeking to make their own decisions about their reproductive health and their future."

State Senator Liz Krueger said, "The rights of Americans to make the most personal decisions about their own reproductive healthcare are under attack like never before, and that means those of us who stand for Americans' freedom and bodily autonomy need to take action on multiple fronts to keep those rights secure. I thank Governor Hochul for getting this funding out the door to help protect providers, patients, and families in New York from the increasing violence of anti-abortion extremists."

The Division of Criminal Justice Services provides critical support to all facets of the state's criminal justice system, including, but not limited to: training law enforcement and other criminal justice professionals; overseeing a law enforcement accreditation program; ensuring Breathalyzer and speed enforcement equipment used by local law enforcement operate correctly; managing criminal justice grant funding; analyzing statewide crime and program data; providing research support; overseeing county probation departments and alternatives to incarceration programs; and coordinating youth justice policy. Five Consecutive Years Without Tax Levy Increase at Fallsburg Central School

Residents of Fallsburg Central School District will be delighted to learn that there will be no tax levy increase for the newly proposed budget. On April 18, the Board of Education adopted a budget of \$59,260,373.00 for the 2023-2024 fiscal year, which will lead to a 0% increase in the tax levy. This will now mark the fifth consecutive year the school has not seen an increase to the tax levy.

The unique financial situation has presented an opportunity for the district to also address the school's needs without adding onto the tax burden. The Board of Education is also asking the school community to approve a capital reserve fund, which functions as a savings account for potential building projects. A capital reserve fund will allow the district to set aside money, with little to no additional cost to the taxpayers, over several years to fund certain

building projects, such as renovating the school's parking lots. Money will only be allocated to the capital reserve fund if there is a surplus at the end of the year. The funds cannot be established and spent without voter approval and will be capped at \$10,000,000.

The budget vote will take place on May 16, 2023 in the Board of Education meeting room at the Fallsburg Junior-Senior High School. Polls will be open from 8am to 8pm.

The committee will help develop the Beginner Farmer Program, provide guidance for program implementation, and most importantly, provide a farmer perspective rooted in their own agricultural and business experience. The committee will meet 4-6 times a year. Each member will be compensated \$150.00 for each meeting attended. Advisory Committee membership will change annually to ensure the program is guided by a diverse range of farming perspectives and experiences.

Currently, CCE is seeking farmers and farm business owners who are invested in the success of beginner farmers and the creation of resilient farm operations in Sullivan County to join the Advisory Committee.

DEC Announces Spring Turkey Season Opens May 1

Season Now Includes Suffolk County Hunting Opportunities New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos today announced that spring turkey season opens May 1, in all counties north of the Bronx-Westchester County boundary and, new for 2023, in Suffolk County on Long Island (Wildlife Management Unit 1C).

"Opening a spring turkey season on Long Island is a success story for wildlife conservation," Commissioner Seggos said. "After their translocation to Long Island in the 1990s, turkey numbers in Suffolk County increased to a level where these birds can now be responsibly and sustainably harvested through recreational hunting. DEC encourages turkey hunters throughout the state to act responsibly, follow regulations, and adhere to the cardinal rules of hunting safety for a safe and enjoyable season afield."

In addition to the new opportunities on Long Island, another change that went into effect last fall allows shot sizes as small as Number 9 for turkey hunting. This regulatory change affects both the spring and fall seasons statewide. The change was made to modernize regulations as technology has advanced over the years to increase the down-range effectiveness of smaller shot sizes.

Spring turkey harvest in New York averages about 18,000 birds and varies based on the number of participants and turkey productivity in previous springs. This spring, improved turkey harvest is expected compared to last year. Hunters prefer to take toms (2+ year-old birds) typically producing a two-year lag between summer productivity and spring take.

Overall, turkey populations are lower now than a few years ago due to below-average reproductive success two of the last four years. However, improved turkey productivity in 2020 and 2022 means a greater proportion of toms available to hunters this spring compared to last year.

Other Important Details for the Spring Turkey Season, May 1-31:

Hunting is permitted in most areas of the state, except for New York City and Nassau County;

Hunters must have a turkey hunting permit in addition to their hunting license;

Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to noon each day;

Hunters may take two bearded turkeys during the spring season, but only one bird per day and no more than one bird per season in Wildlife Management Unit 1C (Suffolk County);

Hunters may not use rifles or handguns firing a bullet. Hunters may hunt with a shotgun or handgun loaded with shot sizes no larger than Number 2 or smaller than Number 9, or with a bow or crossbow (except crossbows may not be used in Westchester or Suffolk counties);

Successful hunters must fill out the tag that comes with their turkey permit and immediately attach it to any turkey harvested;

Successful hunters must report their harvest within seven days of taking a bird. Call 1-866-426-3778 (1-866 GAMERPT), or report the harvest online at DEC's Game Harvest Reporting webpage; and

DEC encourages hunters to use common sense this season and remember what they were taught in their DEC Hunter Education Course including: Point your gun in a safe direction; Treat every gun as if it were loaded; Be sure of your target and beyond; Keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot; and

Stalking stinks! Sit with your back against a tree or other object wider than your shoulders and call birds to you.

A hunter education class is required for all hunters. To find a hunter education class in your area, visit DEC's Hunter Education Program website or call 1-888-HUNT-ED2 (1-888-486-8332).

Tips for a Successful and Safe Turkey Hunting Season


Don't stalk. More than half of turkey hunting injuries happen when one hunter stalks another; Always assume any call or footsteps you hear are from another hunter. Don't shoot until you clearly see the whole turkey and know its sex; If you see another hunter, talk to them clearly, and don't move. Never wave or use a turkey call to alert another hunter; Turkeys are tough. You need to be close before you shoot (30 yards or closer is best). You need to get a clear head and neck shot. Do not try to shoot the turkey in the body or when they are flying; Smaller shot, Number 4, 5, and 6, work better than larger shot, due to denser shot patterns; When calling, sit still with your back against a big tree, to hide you from turkeys and stalkers; Never wear turkey colors -- red, white, or blue; Wear hunter orange when going in or out of the woods and when walking around to make yourself more visible to other hunters; When sitting still waiting for a turkey, put hunter orange on a tree near you to alert other hunters to your presence; and If you take a turkey or carry a decoy, wrap it in hunter orange.

Buy Sporting Licenses Online

Sporting licenses may be purchased online at any time and anglers may use their privileges immediately by simply carrying their transaction number (DEC-LS#) with them while afield. Anglers, hunters, and trappers may also use the HuntFishNY mobile app to display an electronic copy of their license. The HuntFishNY app is available for download through the Apple App or Google Play stores. Back tags and carcass tags must still be mailed, and customers should allow 10-14 days for receipt of their tags. Please visit our website for more information about sporting licenses.

DEC Forest Rangers - Week in Review Recent Statewide Forest Ranger Actions

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Forest Rangers respond to search and rescue incidents statewide. Working with other state agencies, local emergency response organizations, and volunteer search and rescue groups, Forest Rangers locate and extract lost, injured, or distressed people from across New York State.

In 2022, DEC Forest Rangers conducted 359 search and rescue missions, extinguished 162 wildfires covering more than 1,300 acres, participated in 53 prescribed fires that served to rejuvenate nearly 900 acres of land, and worked on cases that resulted in hundreds of tickets and arrests.

'With more people visiting State lands and enjoying New York's myriad, world-class outdoor recreational opportunities, DEC's Forest Rangers are on the front lines to help visitors get outside responsibly and get home safely," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "Each day, these highly trained first responders are protecting irreplaceable natural resources and utilizing their expert knowledge of wildland fire suppression, wilderness first aid, land navigation, law enforcement, and technical rescue techniques to successfully execute critical missions, for DEC and our countless local, state, and national partners."

Statewide Wildfires: From April 11 to 17

Forest Rangers were called to 26 wildfires in 16 counties that burned nearly 1,000 acres of land. The largest fires were in the town of Deerpark in Orange County at 300 acres, and in the town of Richmondville where the fire totaled 241 acres and spanned Otsego and Schoharie counties. In both fires, Forest Rangers worked with New York State Police (NYSP) Aviation to perform dozens of bucket drops. The relationship between Rangers and NYSP pilots is invaluable. Their training and experience make it possible to successfully contain these fires. Rangers coordinated firefighting efforts with State agency partners including the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services, Office of Fire Prevention and Control, New York State Parks, Department of Transportation, Office of Emergency Management, dozens of local responders, volunteer firefighters, and other DEC staff trained in wildland fire suppression. DEC reminds New Yorkers the annual statewide ban prohibiting residential brush burning began March 16 and runs through May 14. The largest cause of spring brushfires in New York is residential burning. More information is available on the DEC website.

Using a competitive grant process, ESD ensured that the awarded funding is impact-driven, and the awarded projects are responsive to the program's intended focus. New York State is concentrating on sectors most in need of help, or areas representing the most promising opportunity for growth. GRANTS CORNER REMINDER!

Applications are open for:

The U.S. Department of Transportation's new Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Discretionary Grant Program, established by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, will provide \$2.5 billion over five years to a wide range of applicants, including cities, counties, local governments, and Tribes. This round of funding makes up to \$700 million from fiscal years 2022 and 2023 funding available to strategically deploy EV charging and other alternative vehicle-fueling infrastructure projects in publicly accessible locations in urban and rural communities, as well as along designated Alternative Fuel Corridors (AFCs). Due May 30.

EDA Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance (PWEAA) supports bottom-up strategies that build on regional assets to spur economic growth and resiliency. EDA encourages its grantees throughout the country to develop initiatives that present new ideas and creative approaches to advance economic prosperity in distressed communities.

The Department of Justice opened the applications for numerous grants for its **Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS)** program to hire community police, develop and test innovative policing strategies, and provide training and technical assistance to community members, local government leaders, and all levels of law enforcement.

The Industrial Demonstrations Program opened grants funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to accelerate decarbonization projects in energy-intensive industries and provide American manufacturers a competitive advantage in the emerging global clean energy economy. Environmental Justice Thriving Communities Grantmaking program is funded by the Biden Administration's Inflation Reduction Act and will invest in America and expedite investments to reduce pollution in disadvantaged communities. EPA plans to award cooperative agreement(s) to pass-through entities (referred to as Grantmakers by the program) who will collaborate with EPA to design and build their own processes to receive and evaluate competitive community project applications from communities for EJ Thriving Communities Subgrant activities. These activities consist of assessment, planning, and/or project development activities addressing local environmental and/or public health issues. Grantmakers will provide EJ Thriving Communities Subgrants (i.e., subawards) to Eligible Subrecipients. Due May 31.

Local Agriculture Market Program (LAMP) grants with USDA support the development, coordination, and expansion of direct producer-to-consumer marketing; local and regional food markets and enterprises; and value-added agricultural products. Due May 2.

Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program provides grants up to \$125,000 per year for five years to community coalitions to strengthen the infrastructure among local partners to create and sustain a reduction in local youth substance use.

Transparency and a well-informed public are vital components of our self-governing Constitutional Republic! I'm committed to restoring transparency to government, which is why I explain every vote I take on the House floor.

Some of the key bills we considered this week are explained below. To read more about these votes and see the full list with explanations of all the legislation considered this week by the House of Representatives, please click here.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 734, Protection of Women and Girls in Sports Act of 2023. This bill would prohibit biological men from competing in women's sports and depriving women of athletic opportunities guaranteed by Title IX. The facts are clear: biological men are different from biological women and have distinct advantages over women in many athletic events. Allowing biological men to compete against women strips women of scholarship opportunities and the Title IX protections that generations of women fought for. I was disappointed that my Democratic colleagues opposed this commonsense bill, which I was honored to have introduced on behalf of the sponsor, Representative Greg Steube. This bill passed the House of Representatives by a vote of 219-203.

I voted "Yes" on H.J. Res. 42, Disapproving the action of the District of Columbia Council in approving the Comprehensive Policing and Justice Reform Amendment Act of 2022. This resolution would nullify DC's new extreme law that undermines the safety of our police officers and their ability to do their jobs effectively. This law is an attempt by the DC Council to support the defund the police movement. This law will restrict police access to the tools they need to do their jobs and even threaten their privacy. In fact, this law was so extreme, that even DC Mayor Muriel Bowser refused to sign it into law. Since the bill was enacted, 1,190 police officers have left the DC police force and the city has experienced a sharp spike in crime. We should combat America's growing crime crisis and anti-police rhetoric by supporting our law enforcement officers, and this should start right here in our Nation's capital. This resolution passed the House of Representatives by a bipartisan vote of 229-189.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 1149, the Countering Untrusted Telecommunications Abroad Act, as amended. The bill requires the Secretary of State to report on the presence of untrusted telecommunications equipment or services in the United States and our embassies and recommend acts to protect the U.S. from them. As Chinese companies such as TikTok and Huawei continue to target Americans, we must do more to combat these unsafe technologies by securing our telecommunications network from foreign interference and espionage. This bill passed the House by a vote of 410-8. (Contd. Pg. 57)

I voted "Yes" on the veto message for H.J. Res. 27, a joint resolution of disapproval of the Biden Administration's "Waters of the United States" (WOTUS) rule. Last December, the Biden Administration released its new navigable waters definition, overturning the previous Trump Administration rule. This change radically expands the scope of this federal regulation and fails to provide a firm definition of covered waterways. The change will enable the Environmental Protection Agency to apply red tape to large swaths of private and agricultural land across the country. Also, because the definition is not well crafted, many landowners will need to ask the EPA for clarification before doing work on their land, a process that can often take years. This is completely impractical and totally unworkable, amounting to an extreme power grab by the federal government. The Clean Water Act was enacted to protect major bodies of water like the Great Lakes or the Oswego River, not the drainage ditch next to your driveway. However, after this commonsense bill to passed in both the House and Senate with bipartisan majorities, President Biden decided to use the second veto of his presidency to kill this bill and protect the priorities of extreme activists. In response, I supported this resolution to override this veto. This bill required a 2/3 majority to pass and failed in the House of Representatives by a vote of 217-202.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 1151, the Upholding Sovereignty of Airspace Act, as amended. This bill rebukes the Chinese Communist Party for its recent violation of American sovereignty with its high-altitude surveillance balloons this February. The bill introduces export controls on aerospace equipment to China, imposes sanctions on individuals related to the CCP's aerospace surveillance program, and requires the Secretary of State to formulate a diplomatic strategy to alert allies about the scope of the CCP's surveillance program. The United States cannot and will not allow foreign adversaries to violate our sovereignty, and we must forcefully condemn such provocative actions while also taking actions to prevent them from ever reoccurring. This bill passed the House by a vote of 405-6.

I voted "Yes" on H.Res. 240, Condemning recent actions taken by the Russian military to down a United States Air Force drone. This resolution denounces the Russian military for targeting an American drone in international airspace on March 14 with two of its fighter jets, which dumped fuel on the drone and then hit it. Additionally, it condemns the Russian armed forces for attempting to recover the drone after it crashed in the Black Sea. These actions were nothing more than an attack on the freedom of navigation in international airspace and waters. It is important we do not stand silently in the face of this aggression. This bill passed the House by a vote of 410-0.

Standing up for New York Farmers

Earlier this month, as part of my Farm Bill Listening Tour, I met with farmers and producers across New York's 24th District, who expressed concerns that President Biden's new WOTUS rule was overly broad and poorly defined.

This is why I supported H.J. Res. 27 to overturn it. And it is why I voted again this week to override Biden's veto of that joint resolution. With his irresponsible veto of H.J. Res. 27, President Biden proved once again that he continues to prioritize far-left activists over our nation's farmers and landowners. Our region's farmers are among the best stewards of our natural environment, and they should be viewed as important part-

ners in conversation efforts. Instead, Biden's WOTUS rule targets them with even more regulations, which are overly burdensome and will drive up costs at a time of already soaring inflation.

Molinaro Backs Bill to Provide Major Boost to Rural Broadband Projects

Washington, DC - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today announced he is cosponsoring the Eliminating Barriers to Rural Internet Development Grant Eligibility (E-BRIDGE) Act. This bill was authored by U.S. Rep. Sam Graves (MO-6), Chairman of the House Committee on Transportation & Infrastructure.

The E-BRIDGE Act removes hurdles to access Economic Development Administration (EDA) grants for broadband projects. It also gives communities more flexibility to comply with non-federal cost sharing requirements on these projects.

Rep. Molinaro said, "Gaps in internet connectivity are holding us back. That's why I'm working to expand internet access in rural communities by backing the E-BRIDGE Act. This bill is going to eliminate barriers to bring more broadband projects online."

Tioga County Legislative Chair, Martha Sauerbrey said, "Tioga County residents are experiencing a digital divide. Our families, businesses, and schools need a reliable internet connection to thrive and compete. We are grateful that Congressman Molinaro recognizes the importance of rural internet connectivity and applaud him for leading this effort to bring broadband projects to rural communities."

By helping increase the reach of broadband in rural and economically distressed communities, the E-BRIDGE Act will help: Attract new businesses and support current businesses.

Strengthen healthcare systems and the delivery of medical care to vulnerable populations.

Lay the groundwork for economic recovery in rural areas. Better prepare communities for future disasters or epidemics.

As a member of the House Committee on Transportation & Infrastructure, Rep. Molinaro has been working to expand broadband in local rural communities and recently voted for bipartisan legislation that will streamline new infrastructure projects, including broadband projects.

On April 22,2023 we celebrated Earth Day, but unfortunately our earth is in serious trouble.

Gillibrand, Rounds Lead Group of 41 Bipartison Senators in Call to Fully Fund U.S.-Israel Missile Defense Cooperation Programs

WASHINGTON, D.C. - This week, U.S. Senators Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY) and Mike Rounds (R-SD) led a bipartisan group of 41 senators in calling for \$500 million to fully fund U.S.-Israel cooperative missile defense programs in the Defense Appropriations bill for Fiscal Year 2024. Israel's missile defense system is made up of four operational layers: Iron Dome, David's Sling, Arrow 2 and now Arrow 3. In addition to contributing to ballistic missile defense, these systems play an important role in countering hostile unmanned aerial systems.

"Continued support of the U.S.-Israel collaborative defense programs is critical to meeting the United States' and Israel's national security needs," wrote the senators. "In addition to ballistic missile defense, this \$500 million in federal funding will continue critical work on these air defense systems that can help counter hostile unmanned aerial systems. Together, these programs confront the compelling challenges facing both Israel and the United States and represent the enduring friendship of our nations."

Senators Gillibrand and Rounds have long led this bipartisan letter in support of U.S.-Israeli cooperative missile defense programs, which advance U.S. national security interests by supporting Israel's ability to defend itself against missile and rocket attacks. For several years, the senators have led letters that have secured at least \$500 million annually for these important programs. In the Senate, Gillibrand has led the letter dating back to at least 2012.

In addition to Senators Gillibrand and Rounds, the letter was signed by Senators Baldwin (D-WI), Bennet (D-CO), Blumenthal (D-CT), Booker (D-NJ), Brown (D-OH), Budd (R-NC), Cantwell (D-WA), Cardin (D-MD), Casey (D-PA), Coons (D-DE), Cortez Masto (D-NV), Cramer (R-ND), Duckworth (D-IL), Feinstein (D-CA), Fetterman (D-PA), Hassan (D-NH), Hickenlooper (D-CO), Kaine (D-VA), Kelly (D-AZ), Klobuchar (D-MN), Lankford (R-OK), Luján (D-NM), Markey (D-MA), Marshall (R-KS), Merkley (D-OR), Ossoff (D-GA), Padilla (D-CA), Peters (D-MI), Rosen (D-NV), Rubio (R-FL), Schatz (D-HI), Scott (R-FL), Sinema (I-AZ), Smith (D-MN), Stabenow (D-MI), Thune (R-SD), Vance (R-OH), Warner (D-VA), and Wyden (D-OR).

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DVAA Announces 2023 Spring Exhibitions

The Delaware Valley Arts Alliance (DVAA) is excited to announce its upcoming spring exhibitions. Opening on Saturday, May 13th, are two mixed-media artists that challenge the ideas of domesticity and explore feminist themes by reworking and manipulating their artwork using fiber arts. Heather Bause-Rubinstein's exhibition, "High Tide" will be on view in the Alliance Gallery, and Melissa Zexter's "Phantom Web" will be presented in the Loft Gallery.

Please join us for an opening reception for both artists on Saturday, May 13th, 2023, from 4-6 PM. The shows will be on view through Sunday, June 25th. DVAA's galleries are free and open to the public.

Heather Bause-Rubinstein High Tide

On View May 13th - June 25th Opening Reception: May 13th, 4-6 PM – Artist Talk scheduled for Saturday, June 17th; please see the website for details.

Heather Bause-Rubinstein creates abstract paintings on found materials and reclaimed domestic textiles. The resulting pieces come together with the quilt-like, intense layering of paint and fabric, interwoven with textures thread. She sources materials from thrift household



linens, crochets, cheap designer scarves, and women's business jackets, often favoring fabrics made in the 1970s and 1980s, the period of the artist's childhood.



The exhibition title, "High Tide," refers to the summer of 2022 Rubinstein was confined to bed for many months with a broken ankle. Unable to work in her studio and inspired by her view of the Harlem and Hudson Rivers, she began making paintings on the pages of wallpaper sample books. This opened a new direction in the artist's work, a return to painting with oil on canvas. "High Tide" includes one of these wallpaper books and several new paintings.

Rubinstein divides her time between Callicoon and New York City. She received a BFA and MFA in Painting


and Art History from the University of Houston. She has exhibited in numerous solo and group shows in New York, Houston, and beyond. Rubinstein's work as an artist, designer, and teacher has been recognized with several grants, including the Artist as Entrepreneur grant from the Bronx Museum and two City Artist Corps Grants from the City of New York. She was also awarded the National Graphic Design Award and an American Advertising Award.

Melissa Zexter | Phantom Web

Melissa Zexter's work combines embroidery with photography to explore memory and personal experience. Sewing by hand directly onto photographs she has taken, Zexter combines the traditional, practical skill of embroidery with the modern and reproducible process of photography. The results are hand-crafted, unique photographic objects in an age where images- specifically photographic images - have lost their 'object status' alto-

gether. In exploring the photograph's ontology - its material sta-



tus as a three-dimensional object - Zexter opens a conversation around issues of identity and memory are shaped by photographic technology. Each photographic work becomes unique and unreproducible, as a result of Zexter's manipulating the image's surface embroidery or the partial removal of the emulsion.

Zexter was born in Rhode Island and lives in Brooklyn, NY. She holds a BFA in Photography from

the Rhode Island School of Design and an MFA from New York University. Zexter has exhibited throughout the United States and internationally, including shows at Muriel Guépin Gallery, NY, The Triennial Design Museum in Milan, Italy, The Fuller Craft Museum, MA, Robert Mann Gallery, NY, and the Bronx Museum of the Arts. Her work has been published and reviewed in numerous publications, including ELEPHANT, AfterImage, Juxtapoz, The New York Times, The New Yorker, and New York Magazine.


Six of Sondheim's musicals won Tony Awards for best score, and he also received a Pulitzer Prize ("Sunday in the Park"), an Academy Award (for the song "Sooner or Later" from the film "Dick Tracy"), five Olivier Awards and the Presidential Medal of Honor. In 2008, he received a Tony Award for lifetime achievement. Sondheim's music and lyrics gave his shows a dark, dramatic edge, whereas before him, the dominant tone of musicals was frothy and comic. He was sometimes criticized as a composer of *unhummable* songs, a badge that didn't bother Sondheim. Frank Sinatra, who had a hit with Sondheim's "Send in the Clowns," once complained: "He could make me a lot happier if he'd write more songs for saloon singers like me.

Behind every great performance are hours of dedicated work of such was the task of Steven Sondheim when creating wonderful musical scores for all of our pleasures. Steven Sondheim on to a new learning level at 91, no more RIP the soul is immortal. Enjoy.


