DAYS OF YORE.... Today's History

J<u>uly 22, 1953</u>

William Coombe of Ellenville. Following the ceremony a reception was held at the home of the bride's aunt, Mrs. Robert Many. They will make their home in Delhi where Mr. Maier is a teacher at the University.

At a recent meeting in Woodbourne, residents discussed the drying up of the Neversink River as a result of New York City impounding the water in the Neversink Dam. Citizens of that area say that the river has become a mere trickling stream fed by a ten inch pipe and that the lack of water constitutes a fire hazard because all the water for firefighting comes from the Neversink.

LOOKING BACK

On looking out over the Neversink Reservoir today, we would never believe that where the dam is now there once was a village and somewhere around there, a racetrack. My husband and his father, Charles Akerley, quite often told the story of when my husband was growing up, his dad owned a beautiful, spirited horse named Danny. In the year 1891 the Neversink Driving Park at Dan Pierce's track had horse racing. Charles entered Danny in one of the races. He was doing real good too and had a good chance at winning had he not stumbled and fallen on his left knee just before the finish line.

That meet attracted a great many people and some of the bettors were from New York City and Brooklyn who were staying at the "Spring Brook House' where my husband, his mother and dad had supper. It was a very enjoyable occasion. The dining room was decorated with wild flowers and the grounds were illuminated with many colored Japanese lanterns. Music for the occasion was furnished by "Freer's Neversink Orchestra".

A few years later, after moving to Livingston Manor, my father-in-law had a beautiful team of horses stolen from his barn and were never recovered.

Ancient Self Heal

Here is a another little plant that is beginning to blossom in our backyard that doesn't deserve to be overlooked - Prunella vulgaris - commonly known as Self Heal or Heal All. Most like-

ly you have Self Heal growing in your lawn. It is that little unassuming purple flower that most of us cut down when mowing the lawns. But the fact is, that this little plant has a long history. Selfheal is an ancient medicine. Dating back 2,000 years ago it is mentioned in Chinese medicinal literature. They used it to treat the liver, kidneys and skin problems. In medieval Europe it was used to treat throat problems and skin conditions. Several Native



American tribes used it to treat heart conditions, reduce fever, boils, cuts bruises and skin problems.

Because the plants are known to concentrate lead compounds and other pollutants, it is no longer recommended as a medicinal herb, especially if gathered near roadsides or polluted areas.

Self Heal is often used as erosion control along roadsides, stream banks and pond edges as it is a perennial and has the potential to cover crop to provide a habitat for pollinators and other beneficial insects.

Self Heal is easily recognized by its erect, many-flowered spikes and overlapping hairy bracts.

Self Heal is a perennial that grows from short rhizomes on an enlarged solitary or clustered upright stem stems that are generally un-branched, slightly hairy above. e It is a member of the mint family. Like other members of the mint family (Lamiaceae), it has square stems and opposite leaves.

Typically this plant grows 4 to 10 inches in height although some native varieties may grow taller. It is a fibrous-rooted plant that grows from a root crown or short rhizome that thrives in loamy soil with high organic content. It especially prefers damp soils, yet can tolerate some drought conditions.

The flowers are arranged in a tight cluster 1 to 2 inches long by about 1 inch wide at the end of the stem. Within the cluster, the flowers are arranged in whorls of sixes, with each whorl above two spreading, pointed, leaf-like bracts. Flowers bloom progressively on the spike from the lower to upper end. Each tubular flower is about a half inch long and divided into two lips. The upper lip is light purple and functions as a hood, while the lower lip is whitish and fringed. The lower lip also has two lateral lobes that are smaller and light purple. The calyx is light green or reddish and quite hairy along the edges. The blossoms have no noticeable floral scent. Self Heal generally blooms from mid to late summer. Each flower produces four tiny seeds, which are located in the calyx.

Self Heal will form a dense mat with small leaves when repeatedly mowed or grazed.

Today Self Heal is still considered a valuable addition to a wildflower meadow or butterfly garden. When planting Self Heal in your flower garden, you may want to consider the fact that it can become a bit 'weedy'.

But as far as weeds go, Self- Heal is one of the best. It provides food for many different insect species.



Miraculum Mysterious Book Report No. 391

We humans all have one thing in common . . . we are endlessly curious. We've just gotta know how and why things happen, as well as where, when and what. We are compelled as a species to look through the window, open the door, or peek around the corner to see what we haven't seen and learn what we don't know. Add in a smidgen of the illicit, tawdry, mysterious, risqué, or unbelievable . . . and the urge to investigate becomes an almost irresistible itch for most of us. It's an itch we have to scratch. Hell, we'll even pay an admission fee.

Such is the premise behind Pontilliar's Spectacular Star Light Miraculum, and the basis for a richly imagined, well crafted and brilliantly executed novel that locks the forces of good and evil into a struggle for survival, as the normal battles the paranormal in a fight over what it means to be human.



Miraculum, (Polis Books, \$26.00, 336 pages, ISBN 978-1-947993-41-9) by Steph Post, begins in 1922, out near Texas-Louisiana border where Mr. Pontilliar's carnival has just set up for a three day run before moving on to the big city of Baton Rouge. The crowds are mediocre, the heat almost unbearable and boredom oppressive one starlit summer night, when Ruby, the tattooed snake charmer, first notices the strange man standing in the crowd, lighting a cigarette. He's unusually good-looking, cool and collected despite the heat and the fact that he's wearing a



black suit and tie which cost more than the entire carnival is worth. The outlander's name is Daniel. He's charming, mercurial, and charismatic when he joins the carnival as a geek . . . a performer who bites live chickens for entertainment. There's something off about Daniel, something that hints of malice, maybe evil, and controversy seems to swirl about him. Odd things occur whenever he's around . . . then tragic deaths happen to a couple of performers, and the usually collegial, tight-knit community of carneys starts unraveling as a horrified Ruby and her lover, a roughneck named Hayden, try to fight back against a widening tide of darkness in this terrific paranormal yarn that will linger in the reader's mind long after the last page is read.

Look out Peter Straub. Step aside, Stephen King and John Connolly. There's a hot new writer on the scene, and damn, she's good! Her name is Steph Post.


What's all the Buzz About? July Happenings at DPL

DEC Announces Multi-Year Research Study to Improve Bald and Golden Eagle Conservation Efforts

Rebate Available for Eligible Hunters to Purchase Non-Lead Ammunition

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos today announced DEC is seeking hunters to participate in a multi-year study of non-lead ammunition impacts on the State's eagle conservation efforts. DEC is partnering with the New York Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit at Cornell University, U.S. Geological Survey, and Conservation Science Global on the study to determine the reduction in bald and golden eagle deaths that can be achieved from increased use of non-lead ammunition for deer hunting.

"Hunters in North America are the backbone of wildlife conservation and often help lead the charge in numerous wildlife management success stories like the restoration of white-tailed deer and wild turkey," said Commissioner Seggos. "The study announced today to assess the potential benefits of non-lead ammunition to New York's bald and golden eagle populations is a prime example of how hunters can help conserve wildlife, and I thank the New York deer hunters who volunteer to be part of the project."

Eagles can ingest lead bullet fragments when scavenging the remains left behind after a hunter field dresses a deer. While the bald eagle population is doing well in New York, research has shown that lead-related mortality has slowed population growth. The golden eagle population in the eastern U.S. is relatively stable, although vulnerable to a potential population decline due to lead poisoning. This study aims to determine whether this source of mortality can be reduced by increasing the proportion of hunters using non-lead ammunition.

To help recruit hunters to participate in the study, DEC's research partners will be offering rebates of up to \$60 for the purchase of certified non-lead ammunition and participation in pre- and post-hunt surveys. Administration of the rebates will be fulfilled by Conservation Science Global. Participation in the rebate program is voluntary and will be available to hunters issued a Deer Management Permit (DMP) in the following Wildlife Management Units (WMUs): 3H, 4F, 4G, 4H, 4O, 4P, 4R, 4W, and 6G. These WMUs were selected based on greater abundance of eagles and deer harvest success. Focusing eligibility to these areas will concentrate the impact of non-lead ammunition use, allowing for a greater ability to estimate the effects on eagle populations.

The first year of the study will be implemented during the 2023-24 hunting season. DEC expects to continue offering rebates during the 2024 and 2025 hunting seasons. For more information and where eligible hunters can participate, visit the Hunters for Eagle Conservation website.

This research was identified as a high priority in DEC's report, "Minimizing Risks to Wildlife and People from Lead Hunting Ammunition." Since the release of this report in April 2022, DEC and partners have taken several steps to implement recommendations in the plan towards minimizing the risks associated with lead ammunition for hunting. DEC Forest Rangers -Week in Review Recent Statewide Forest Ranger Actions

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Forest Rangers respond to search and rescue incidents statewide. Working with other state agencies, local emergency response organizations, and volunteer search and rescue groups, Forest Rangers locate and extract lost, injured, or distressed people from across New York State.

"With more people visiting State lands and enjoying New York's myriad, world-class outdoor recreational opportunities, DEC's Forest Rangers are on the front lines to help visitors get outside responsibly and get home safely," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "Each day, these highly trained first responders are protecting irreplaceable natural resources and utilizing their expert knowledge of wildland fire suppression, wilderness first aid, land navigation, law enforcement, and technical rescue techniques to successfully execute critical missions, for DEC and our countless local, state, and national partners."

Town of Shandaken -Ulster County

Wilderness Search: On July 12 at 6:30 p.m., Central Dispatch called Forest Ranger Horn about a lost hiker in the Slide Mountain Wilderness. Cell phone coordinates placed the 26-year-old from West Islip near the summit of Wittenberg Mountain. Ranger Horn spoke to the subject via phone and determined that due to their lack of experience and proper gear, the hiker should wait there for Ranger assistance. Rangers Horn and Sweeney reached the subject at 10:45 p.m., provided gear, food and water, and began escorting him toward the trailhead. Resources were clear at 2 a.m.

Town of Shawangunk- Ulster County

Wilderness Rescue: On July 15 at 3:30 p.m., Forest Rangers were notified about an injured hiker in Shawangunk Ridge State Forest. Bloomington, Cragsmoor, Summitville, and Walker Valley fire departments also responded. Volunteer firefighters determined the 60-year-old from Ithaca had an unstable leg injury. Firefighters drove three-quarters of a mile into the woods. Rangers and firefighters then hiked the final three-quarters of a mile to reach the subject, splinted their leg, and packaged her into a litter for a carry-out. Mamakating EMS transported the subject to the hospital. Resources were clear at 6:40 p.m.

Be sure to properly prepare and plan before entering the backcountry. Visit DEC's Hike Smart NY, Adirondack Backcountry Information, and Catskill Backcountry Information webpages for more information.

If a person needs a Forest Ranger, whether it's for a search and rescue, to report a wildfire, or to report illegal activity on state lands and easements, they should call 833-NYS-RANGERS. If a person needs urgent assistance, they can call 911. To contact a Forest Ranger for information about a specific location, the DEC website has phone numbers for every Ranger listed by region.



Jimmy Carter Selected as the 2023 recipient of The Catskill Fly Fishing Center and Museum's Lee Wulff Conservation Award Livingston Manor, NY

The Executive Committee of The Catskill Fly Fishing Center and Museum is pleased to announce that President Jimmy Carter has been selected as the 2023 recipient of CFFCM's Lee Wulff Conservation Award.



The stories of Carter's enormous contribution to the museum's initial construction are hard to miss. A larger than life image of him fly fishing The Catskills is prominently displayed in our permanent collection along with letters and supporting memorabilia from his historic visit and fundraising drive in 1984. However, Carter's contributions to the preservation of the Delaware River system are often overlooked. In 1978, Carter established more than 73 miles of river between the towns of Hancock and Sparrow Bush as the Upper Delaware Scenic and Recreational River - a national park. This designation not only helps protect the waterway as a vital component of our local economies, but the park also serves as a backbone for the fundraising initiatives of local conservation agencies throughout the region.

Carter's commitment to conservation and the establishment of irrevocable public spaces make him an ideal recipient for Wulff's namesake award. His legacy has been honored an uncountable number of times, but one of our favorites is the naming of a fish



after Carter in 2012. The "Bluegrass Darter" (etheostoma jimmycarter) was named after the 39th president of the United States for his environmental leadership and accomplishments in the areas of national energy policy and wilderness protection, and his lifelong commitment to social justice and basic human rights. He's had a beetle named after him as well, but we're partial to the small colorful darter native to the Green River drainage in Kentucky and Tennessee.

The museum's decision to honor President Carter has prompted some individuals who were a part of his time in The Catskills to share their stories of this remarkable man. The museum will share these and other stories leading up to the formal presentation of the award at the museum's Hall of Fame Ceremony this fall. Previous award recipients include Ted Rogowski, Peter Kolesar, John Waldron, Robert Boyle, and Stephen Sloan.



Heritage Brook Trout Project - Round 3 Completed!

On June 29, we completed our third collection effort as part of the Chapter's Heritage Brook Trout Study, which aims to identify genetically unique strains of Catskills brook trout. All of these have been conducted on tributaries in the Esopus Creek watershed, upstream of the Ashokan Reservoir. A short section of the creek was shocked, and 37 brook trout were captured, along with 17 rainbows. Under a DEC-issued permit to conduct this study, a small snippet of the brook trout's caudal fin was taken, and the DNA in these samples will be analyzed. Our chapter will be working with Dr. Spencer Bruce, of the University of Albany, with whom we worked on the prior two studies, to analyze what was collected in the field.

Participating from Region 3 DEC Fisheries were: Aquatic Biologist Bob Adams and his team of: Russ Berdan, Morgan Cole, and Ed Rolle. Participating from our chapter were: Tony Cocozza, Chris Hensley, George Holz, Chet Karwatowski, Victoria Lawrence, Mark Loete, and me. Photos are by Max Kelly of AWSMP.

Esopus Creek / Schoharie Reservoir News

Recreational Releases: As mentioned in the chapter's June newsletter, Part 670 of the Reservoir Release Regulations allow for up to four yearly "recreational releases" on the Esopus Creek by means of the Shandaken Tunnel. In that issue, dates were provided for the requested 2023 releases. The second such requested 2023 dates were July 8 and 9. Since then, these were declined by DEC in an effort to preserve cold water releases to the Esopus Creek via the Shandaken Tunnel through this summer.

Schoharie Reservoir High Level Intake: Informally I have heard DEP's Schoharie Reservoir High Level Intake (HLI) is now partially operational, and had been in use for a short period. (Contd. Pg 55)

(From Pg. 54) This allows for 100 mgd (about 150 cubic feet per second) of flows discharged from the Portal, to be blended with structural intakes in the Shandaken Tunnel. The HLI is an all or nothing operation, and can withdraw water from higher Schoharie Reservoir (SR) elevations. Use of this in the spring should help to preserve limited SR cold water volumes. However, as spring progresses into summer, the higher SR elevations become warmer and sometimes more turbid. It is believed the recent use of SR's HLI may have helped to preserve the limited cold water available for the Esopus Creek this summer. Informally I've heard DEC's Division of Water may have requested DEP to stop using the HLI and only draw water from the coldest levels of the SR given increasing water temperatures recorded by the USGS Coldbrook gage.

Shandaken Tunnel SPDES Permit: Sometime this coming August, NYC DEP should be conducting a semi-annual review of their Shandaken Tunnel SPDES Permit. I believe it behooves our chapter to press NYC DEP and NYS DEC to provide detailed feedback on the SR HLI, how it currently operates, what's been learned thus far from its operation, and what future plans entail. As editor of this simple newsletter, I for one applaud DEP and DEC for trying to make this work while protecting the wild trout Esopus Creek fishery. Stay tuned!

AWSMP Watershed Conference - July 28-29, 2023

The Ashokan Watershed Stream Management Program, an important partner in our community, is hosting a Watershed Conference on July 28-29, 2023. The theme of the conference is "Learn Your Watershed Land." Day one (July 28) - at the Emerson Resort & Spa in Mt. Tremper - offers programming for local municipal officials. On day two (July 29) - at the Bearsville Theater in Woodstock - the focus will be on watershed landowners. New Esopus Creek Public Access

Through various buy-out programs, additional public access is, and will be, available along the Esopus Creek. In the Town of Shandaken, the Rock Cut parcel is being discussed for public use. In the Town of Olive, the former Stucki property along the bottom end of Saw Mill Pool is under review. Under Chapter President Mark Loete's able leadership, with input from the Board of Directors AND membership, we hope to influence development of these parcels in a positive, non-intrusive fashion. The goal is to avoid another "Blue Hole" situation along the Esopus Creek.

Supporting our Men and Women in Uniform

The National Defense Authorization Act is a critical investment in our national security, our servicemembers, and their families. This year's NDAA takes significant strides in modernizing our armed forces, bolstering our military readiness, and enhancing our defense capabilities. Working to Restore Trust in our Elections

NDAA Passes with Seven Bipartisan Molinaro-Authored Measures

Washington, DC - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today announced seven bipartisan measures he authored were included in the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year 2024. Rep. Molinaro had more policy inclusions than every other freshmen Member of Congress.

The NDAA, which Rep. Molinaro voted in support of, authorizes the budget and expenditures for the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) for Fiscal Year 2024. The bill includes a 5.2% pay raise for our heroes, the largest in over 20 years. Once the House and Senate pass their versions of the bill, lawmakers will begin working to develop a compromised NDAA to be signed into law.

Rep. Molinaro said, "I am thrilled to have seven bipartisan measures that I authored included in the NDAA. They are significant wins for our national defense and the well-being of our servicemembers, military families, and veterans. My measures expand mental healthcare for our military, support military families with disabilities, and ensure access to quality healthcare. With the Senate now developing its own NDAA, I look forward to our continued work to develop and enact a bipartisan bill that fortifies our nation's defense capabilities and safeguards the welfare of those who have bravely served."

Summaries of Molinaro's bipartisan measures included in NDAA:

o Requires routine mental health checkups for children with disabilities in DoD-operated schools.

o Authorizes a Government Accountability Office (GAO) study on the effectiveness of the Exceptional Family Member Program and to identify any improvements that can be made. This program provides support to military families with disabilities.

o Requires the DoD to ensure TRICARE, the military's healthcare program, is fully covering Narcan (naloxone) to prevent fatal overdoses.

o Requires DoD to examine the level of care available for in-home nursing care through TRICARE and CHAM-PVA, the Department of Veterans Affairs' healthcare program, to ensure active duty members, veterans, and their dependents can receive high-quality medical care, at affordable rates.

o Directs the Secretary of the Army to produce a report on the progress made to modernize the Army's Black Hawk Helicopters. o Requires the DoD to produce an update report on the nation's defenses against biological threats.

o Requires a study to identify potential vulnerabilities in U.S. military systems and infrastructure that could be exploited by adversarial AI applications.

Other key provisions in the NDAA:

o Supports a 5.2% pay raise for our servicemembers, the largest in over 20 years.

o Authorizes over \$240 million to reduce servicemember out-of-pocket housing expenses.

o Reduces childcare fees for military families.

o Expands the in-home childcare pilot program to focus on more rural areas.

o Funds the construction of new childcare centers.

o Funds and expands programs to deter Chinese aggression.

o Rejects the Biden administration's effort to reduce the size of the Navy.

o Increases funding to research and develop advanced technologies to defend Israel.





News from Representative Ryan

As we wrap up another productive week, I wanted to give you an update on all that I've been doing on behalf of the Hudson and Delaware Valleys!

REBUILDING AFTER THE FLOOD

This week our community was devastated by historic flooding. We face trying times ahead of cleaning up, recovering, and rebuilding. Yet our community has already started to come together to support and uplift each other.

Thank you to the first responders and volunteers keeping our families safe, and to the neighbors who simply saw a need and extended a helping hand. You are what makes the Hudson Valley a home to all, and I will continue to deliver the full force of the federal government to get you the resources you need.

If you experienced property damage or loss from the flooding, New York State's Department of Financial Services (DFS) is available for assistance with filing insurance claims through the National Flood Insurance Program. Staffers can be reached at the DFS Hotline at (800) 339-1759 or here on the DFS Disaster and Flood Recovery Resource Center's website.

I also joined Senators Schumer and Gillibrand to call for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to activate its Disaster Assessment Teams and prepare to fulfill all requests for federal aid. We also called on the United States Army Corps of Engineers to mobilize resources to immediately assess and repair the extensive damage to the United States Military Academy at West Point.

West Point, home to thousands of our nation's young leaders and military families, is also among the biggest employers in the Hudson Valley, and an American institution of unparalleled significance.

As the first West Point graduate to represent the Academy in Congress, I will keep pushing for restoration efforts.

COMBATING THE LEAD CRISIS IN POUGHKEEP-SIE...

For far too long, families in Poughkeepsie have worried that when they turn on the faucet or when their child uses the water fountain at school, they would be ingesting poisonous lead. This is a crisis that cannot continue

At this week's Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment hearing, I pushed the Environmental Protection Agency to assist Poughkeepsie with replacing its lead pipes. I secured a commitment from the Agency to visit Poughkeepsie in the coming weeks and assist the city in applying for federal grants to remove lead pipes. I will not rest until every lead pipe is removed and every parent can rest assured that their kid is drinking clean water.

AND ACROSS THE HUDSON VALLEY

This past week the Wall Street Journal published a series of explosive reports that telecommunications companies, including Verizon and AT&T, have allowed outdated, legacy cabling leach lead into the environment, including a playground in Wappingers Falls.

This is another case of big corporations polluting our rivers, our drinking water, and now our playgrounds, putting profit over the health and safety of Hudson Valley families.

At this week's Water Resources and Environment Subcommittee hearing, I also pressed the EPA on the authorities available to force the companies to clean up their mess and pay for it.

I will continue to fight until clean air, water, and soil is a reality for all.

BRINGING MY OFFICE TO YOU

GRANTS CORNER

FLOOD RECOVERY:

The Restaurant Disaster Relief Fund provides \$10,000 grants to local restaurants impacted by state or federally declared natural disasters. To be eligible, a business must be experiencing hardship due to a natural disaster, have a maximum of three locations, employ fewer than 50 employees per location, and have revenues of \$3M or less per location in the last 12 months. Grants are funded by DoorDash and applications are due September 29.

REMINDER! Applications are open for:

\$5.575 Billion is available from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's Multimodal Project Discretionary Grant program for three major discretionary grant programs - the Mega program, INFRA program, and Rural program - that involve surface transportation projects designed to strengthen supply chains, spur economic development, and improve safety and daily life. The deadline to apply is August 21.

The Weatherization Assistance Program assists families and individuals by reducing their heating/cooling costs and improving the affordability of their homes through energy efficiency measures. Services are available to both income-eligible homeowners and renters.

Energy efficiency measures include air sealing (weather stripping, caulking), insulation, heating system improvements or replacement, efficiency lighting, and refrigerator replacements with highly efficient Energy Star rated units.

The Biden Administration's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law has \$12 million in Brownfields Job Training Grants to help communities transform brownfield sites into hubs of economic opportunity.

The grants allow organizations to recruit, train, and retain a local, skilled workforce to reduce environmental contamination and build more sustainable futures. Applications due August 2.

The PROTECT Discretionary Grant Program will fund projects that address the climate crisis by improving the resilience of the surface transportation system, including highways, public transportation, ports, and intercity passenger rail. Projects selected under this program should be grounded in the best available scientific understanding of climate change risks, impacts, and vulnerabilities. They should support the continued operation or rapid recovery of crucial local, regional, or national surface transportation facilities. By funding projects that improve resilience to natural hazards and climate change impacts, the PROTECT Discretionary Grant Program aims to reduce damage and disruption to the transportation system, improve the safety of the traveling public, and improve equity by addressing the needs of disadvantaged populations that are often the most vulnerable to hazards. 



Ulster County Awards 16 Municipalities with ARPA Funding for Parks and Recreation Projects

KINGSTON, NY - Ulster County has awarded 16 municipalities with American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding via the County's Municipal Parks and Recreation Grant (MPRG) program to support the development, improvements, and renovations of various parks and recreation areas throughout the County.

The MPRG is intended to enhance public spaces, building on lessons learned during the COVID-19 pandemic about the importance of having accessible, safe, and healthy outdoor opportunities for residents across Ulster County. Eligible projects include such enhancements as Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) amenity upgrades, sensory/inclusivity equipment, surfacing upgrades, green spaces, park maintenance and upkeep, neighborhood cleanup, pedestrian features, recreational facilities, streetlights, and other improvements that revitalize or expand public spaces.

"Our parks and outdoor spaces proved to be among our most valuable assets during the COVID-19 pandemic, enabling safe and healthy recreation and social activity that was simply not possible indoors," said Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger. "We saw clearly during that difficult time how important it is that we preserve and enhance these community spaces for our collective health and well-being, as well as ensure that they are accessible to people of all abilities in our communities. This investment of ARPA funds will pay dividends in public benefits for many years to come."

"I was extremely pleased that the Ulster County Legislature voted to approve my resolution requesting that \$2,000,000 in the County's share of American Rescue Plan Act funds go to funding municipal park projects. During the pandemic, open spaces such as municipal parks and our excellent trail network helped ease the burden of the lockdown by providing residents and their friends and families the opportunity to gather safely outdoors and spend time in nature. This resolution provided matching funds of up to \$100,000 in ARPA funds to the towns to create much-needed projects all around Ulster County," said Ulster County Legislator Eric Stewart. "Our municipal parks offer great recreational opportunities of all kinds from youth sports, to dog walking, jogging, and pickleball-and these services are available to everyone. I view parks as a vital part of Ulster County's green infrastructure, and I am honored-along with my co-sponsor, Legislator Chris Hewitt of the Town of Rochester-to play a role in helping our towns to provide these services.'

"With an emphasis on public health and living a healthy lifestyle, it makes me proud that we are able to give back to the municipalities by providing funding for parks and recreation projects," said Ulster County Legislator Thomas Corcoran. "Recreational exercise, balanced nutrition, and adequate rest all contribute to good health. I'm glad we can encourage and support incremental steps toward healthy living."

"Strong communities are built upon the foundation of parks. These green spaces bring people together, fostering connections, and creating cherished memories," said the Chair of the American Rescue Plan Act Special Committee and Vice Chair of the Ulster County Legislature, Peter Criswell. "By investing ARPA funds into parks, we're cultivating unity, resilience, and lasting joy, ensuring a thriving community for years to come."

In May 2023, Ulster County municipalities were invited to

submit applications for the MPRG program. After a thorough committee review process, 16 Town Supervisors received notification on July 6, 2023, that their proposals for municipal parks and recreation projects were approved and awarded. Project awards include:
