Jeepers Creepers

- What about those Peepers?

For those who have been listening for the peepers and remember th eold

addage - "once you hear the peepers, the water has to freeze over their heads

three times and then the threat of frost will be I hope I missed something. I finally heard the peepers on Friday night in Sundown, and hope all the cold weather we have been feeling suffices for the ice freezing over their heads 3 times!

Looking back to the April 21st *Townsman* last year, "I officially counted two night so far since I first heard the peepers by city field this spring. Hopefully, the peeper prediction will be right on and tonight (Monday)



will be last of freezing weather and in fact, winter weather!!! That was April - this is May and we are still wearing our winter apparel!!! Those poor little thin-skinned peepers. How come they don't freeze?

Nature always has the answer. Evolution has devised a way for these little creatures to stay frozen and still remain alive. Their little bodies began their physiological preparations last fall for their current mating season, a strategy that allows them to start the spring cycle as early as possible which also helps peepers avoid predators. Some males become so well prepared that they begin calling while there is still snow on the ground and freezing weather.

When the peepers emerges from hibernation in early spring, the temperature can often drop below freezing. If the temperature falls to 27° F, the frog can survive as the water inside it remains in a super-cooled state -below its freezing point, but not yet frozen. But once the temperature dips any lower, the water inside the frog can't stay super-cooled, and so it starts to freeze.

For most animals, this would mean a quick death, but not so with the Northern Spring Peeper. They have evolved an incredible strategy to protect them from frost damage. Within 5 minutes of ice crystals starting to form inside the peeper, its liver goes into emergency rescue mode. It's a race between the freezing front that's moving in from the outer parts of the peeper, and the glucose being pumped to the rescue, from the inside out. The sugar levels are therefore highest in its core organs like the liver, heart, kidneys and brain, where glucose levels shoot up as high as 50-fold. Meanwhile, the exterior tissues like skin and skeletal muscle get less glucose because they've already started freezing. The really surprising fact here is that the sugar wasn't in the frog's bloodstream before the freezing started. It was pumped out by the liver immediately after the frog started to freeze. This sugar serves as a 'cryoprotectant '-a biological antifreeze that prevents ice crystals from forming inside the frog's cells.

The little peeper goes into a state of suspended animation. Its breathing, blood flow and heartbeat shut down, and its limbs become frozen stiff. The water under its skin freezes, and the contents of its stomach become a solid ball of ice. More than half of the water in its body turns to ice. Yet it can survive in this frozen state for days, and when the temperature goes back up, the frog thaws and eventually goes back to hopping around and continues singing.

The Latin name of the Northern Spring Peeper is Pseudacris crucifer. Female Northern Spring Peepers will seek out males with the loudest calls, and also prefer the males that repeat their calls the fastest. When the female finds her perfect mate and swims over to a singing male she will touch him to show her amorous intent. The male will fertilize up to 800 eggs as the eggs emerge from the female. The eggs will be deposited individually or in small clusters on submerged vegetation. Females will then retreat from the pond while their little Don Juans continue to serenade for weeks.

We did not evolve as these little peepers. Instead, we will continue to don our winter duds, stay indoors with the thermostat turned up and just wait for the temps to steadily go up. It's May! Peeking at the weather channel, it doesn't look like any more snow, sleet or ice and the lowest temps predicted for the next 10 days will be 37°. Next week we will see a warming trend with more April Showers!!! But —it's May!!


# **Red Sparrow**

# **Mysterious Book Report No. 131**

Move over John LeCarre and Ian Fleming. Take a seat Graham Green, John Gardner and Vince Flynn . . . there's a new spy novel sheriff in town and he's packing plenty of talent, byzantine plotting and exquisite details based on thirty-three years of experience collecting clandestine intelligence in "denied-access" areas of the world with the CIA.

Red Sparrow, (Scribner, \$26.99, 434 pages, ISBN 978-1-4767-0612-2) by Jason Matthews is the real deal. Espionage with a reawakening and belligerent Russia is at the heart of this great first novel by an ex-CIA case officer who's been there and done it all. Russia, under the leadership of Vladimir Putin, is determined to regain its status as a world superpower and be an equal with the US and an emerging China. As one of the Russian characters remarks, 'The cold War never ended,' at least from a Russian point of view.



The novel is about a hunt for a Russian mole. A mole is a person who is burrowed into an enemy organization and is supplying information to that organization's adversaries. In this case, a high-ranking member of the Russian spy organization known as the SVR, which replaced the KGB from the Cold War, is giving secret information about Russian military and spy efforts to a young American CIA case officer named Nathaniel Nash. Known only by the code name MARBLE, the information is excellent, super secret and could have only come from a highly placed SVR official. It's been going on for more than a decade. Determined to catch the smart, crafty and careful mole, the Deputy Director of

the SVR forces his niece into "Sparrow School," where she is trained, against her will, in the arts of seduction. She's the bait in a 'Honey Trap.' Her uncle the Deputy Director intends to further his career by using his niece as a courte-san, hoping to expose the identity of MARBLE through a sexual liaison with the young CIA officer.

The novel is chock-full of suspense, double-crosses, treachery, brutality, backstabbing and spy craft. It's as close to the action as one can get without being in the actual theater of operations and under fire. Reading *Red Sparrow* is a bit like having great sex: it starts out kind of slow and languid, but builds in intensity with every page until you couldn't stop reading, even if the whole damn house was falling down around you! Jason Matthews has poured his guts into this first novel and it's a winner. I'll be reading all of his subsequent works because he writes the kind of novels that you just don't want to end. WOW! Jason Matthews is going to become one of the most respected and revered writers working in the spy thriller genre today if he keeps this up.

Listening to a neighbor's conversation was quite a pastime for some. This had its good and bad points and for the most part, it wasn't a problem. At other times, a couple of neighbors would get so interested in their conversation that they would forget how time flies and you might have to break in and ask to use the line in an emergency. Our neighbors were usually gracious and hung up their phones. Sometimes curiosity took over and we could hear the little clicking sounds that we were familiar with when someone was listening in.

True progress came when "central" was no more but I miss those girls. It is very boring to talk to a machine that doesn't answer my questions or even give me the time of day like central did. I miss that friendly voice from central saying "number please".

In later years, "central" became operators and a few men manned our switchboards.

# DEC Announces Hudson Estuary Trees for Tribs 'Potting Up' April 28 Annual Arbor Day Event Sponsored by DEC's Hudson River Estuary Program

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos today announced the Hudson Estuary Trees for Tribs (tributaries) program will kick-off the spring planting season with a "Potting Up" event in celebration of Arbor Day on Friday, April 28. Volunteers are welcome to join DEC Estuary Program staff in potting up thousands of bare-root seedlings that will be used in the Trees for Tribs program.

"The Hudson Estuary Trees for Tribs program provides a great opportunity for communities to work together as environmental stewards and support the state's efforts to protect vulnerable streamsides with tree plantings," said DEC Commissioner Seggos. "The plantings provide healthy buffers that help reduce



water pollution, erosion, and flood damage and protect the important habitat for fish and other wildlife that thrive along the river. I encourage anyone interested to volunteer in this year's program to help with planting projects throughout the spring."

Hudson Estuary Trees for Tribs plantings will take place throughout the Hudson Valley in May and June. Municipalities, environmental organizations, land trusts, watershed groups, and schools participate and volunteer.

DEC's Colonel William F. Fox Memorial Saratoga Tree Nursery provides the plants. They are native, New York seed-sourced riparian species, ideal for flood and erosion-prone areas. ## Leaders of Local Fire Districts Dive Into Town and State Law

Mandatory Course Trains Them for the Job

Swan Lake, NY - The Sullivan County Emergency Services Training Center on April 22 hosted the Association of Fire Districts of the State of New York (AFDSNY) Commissioner's Training Class for 28 Sullivan County fire commissioners and six out-of-County commissioners.

Each December, fire districts across New York State elect commissioners for five-year terms. All newly elected commissioners must take a training class. In Sullivan County, that was organized by AFDSNY Program and Education Coordinator Cathy DeLuca and Region 10 Director Jill Holland, who's also a Kauneonga Lake firefighter and commissioner.

The class was taught by AFDSNY Instructor Greg Serio of the D'Amato Law Firm. Serio was the NYS Commissioner of Insurance during the administration of Governor George Pataki. He touched on the finer points of town law and the State's General Municipal Law as they affect fire districts. Other topics included Election Law, State Finance Law, Civil Service Law and Public Officers Law. Serio emphasized that commissioners are legally recognized as the "Authority Having Justification" in all matters involving fire districts.

"It was a riveting and eye-opening class for everyone in attendance," noted Deputy Sullivan County Fire Coordinator Jack Halchak. "A particularly interesting discussion was held on conflicts of interest involving individual commissioners and how they do business with the district."

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



# Raccoon Positive for Rabies in the Town of Fremont

Fremont Center, NY - Sullivan County Public Health has confirmed that a raccoon in the Fremont Center area tested positive for the rabies virus.

"The raccoon was killed, and the property owners called Public Health, just as they should," said Public Health Director Karen Holden. "The head of the raccoon was sent to Albany today, and it came back positive for rabies."

Rabies occurs commonly throughout New York State, with the vast majority of cases occurring in wild animals, including raccoons, bats, foxes, skunks and woodchucks. Domestic animals account for less than 10% of the reported rabies cases, which most often include cats, cattle, and dogs. Wild animals may expose your pets if they are allowed to freely roam on your property in wooded areas.

The next regularly scheduled free rabies vaccination clinic for dogs, cats and ferrets, open to anyone in the County and sponsored by the Department of Public Health, will be held on Wednesday, June 14, from 6-7:30 p.m. at Morningside Park in Hurleyville.

Public Health will be working to provide another free clinic in the Fremont area; please check the County website and local media outlets for updates.

What Can People Do to Protect Themselves Against Rabies?

Be sure your pets are up to date on rabies vaccinations. Vaccinated pets serve as a buffer between rabid wildlife and humans. Protect them, and you protect yourself and family. As a pet owner, it is your responsibility to ensure your pets are fully vaccinated.

Vaccines for dogs, cats and ferrets over three months of age are effective for a one-year period. Revaccinations are effective for up to three years. Pets too young to be vaccinated should be kept indoors.

Don't try to separate two fighting animals. Wear gloves if you handle your pet after a fight. Keep family pets indoors at night. Don't leave them outside unattended or let them roam free.

Don't attract wild animals to your home or yard. Keep your property free of stored bird seed, food garbage or other foods that may

attract animals. Feed pets indoors. Tightly cap or put away garbage cans. Board up any openings to your attic, basement, porch or garage. Cap your chimney with screens.

Don't feed, touch or adopt wild animals, stray dogs or stray cats

What if Someone Is Bitten?

Encourage children to immediately tell an adult if they are bitten by any animal. Tell children not to touch any animal except their own.

Seek treatment for all animal bites and report contact with wild animals to Sullivan County Department of Public Health at (845) 292-5910.

If you can safely do so, don't let an animal escape that has possibly exposed someone to rabies. Depending on the species, it can be observed or tested for rabies in order to avoid the need for rabies treatment for people, or to avoid euthanizing and testing exposed unvaccinated pets.

This also includes bats, as bats can be difficult to keep out of buildings because they can get through cracks as small as a pencil. Methods to keep bats out (bat proofing) of homes and summer camps should be done during the fall and winter. If bats are already inside (e.g. in an attic or other areas), consult with your local health department about humane ways to remove them. Bats have small, sharp teeth and in certain circumstances people can be bitten and not know it.

# **Apply Starting May 1 for HEAP Cooling**

Liberty, NY - Worried about suffering in the heat this summer? Sullivan County's HEAP (Home Energy Assistance Program) Office will begin accepting Cooling Benefit applications on Monday, May 1, continuing until funds run out.

The Cooling Benefit can provide eligible applicants with an air conditioner in a room in their home if they suffer from a medical condition that is made worse by extreme heat.

Households that have received any kind of HEAP benefit of \$21 or higher in this past season are eligible to apply for Cooling over the phone: 845-807-0142. If a household has not received a HEAP benefit in this past season, they must complete a full HEAP application - available at the Department of Social Services in Liberty or the Office for the Aging in Monticello. The HEAP Office can also mail printed applications to people by request.

To receive a Cooling Benefit, you must be incomeeligible, you cannot have a working air conditioner already in the home that is less than five years old, and you must have a documentable medical condition. (If an applying household has a member that is over the age of 60 or under the age of 6, documentation of a medical condition is not necessary.)

The State is urging clients to apply as soon as possible due to limited funding. Air-conditioners will be provided on a first-come, first-served basis, and the program will end when funds are exhausted.

# State, Feds, County & Towns Join Forces to Aid Tornado-Hit Residents, Businesses

#### Officials Work Together to Connect People to Assistance

Roscoe, NY - Standing in front of an assistance center in Roscoe today, New York State, Sullivan County, Town of Callicoon and Town of Rockland representatives affirmed their joint intent to collaboratively help local residents and businesses impacted by last Saturday's tornado.

"This is what our community is all about: helping one another in times of need," acknowledged Town of Callicoon Supervisor Tom Bose, whose township was hardest hit by the EF-2 tornado. "As soon as the storm had cleared, I was out on the road, assessing the damage, talking with property owners, and making sure our County, State and Federal leaders understood the level of destruction we were seeing."

"Roscoe sustained a direct hit from the tornado, which the National Weather Service (NWS) estimates contained winds as fierce as 115 MPH," noted Town of Rockland Supervisor Robert Eggleton. "Roofs, trees and signs were struck from Dutch Hill down into the business district, including our town courthouse. We were lucky not to have worse damage than we did."

Based on an assessment by the NWS, the tornado touched down just north of Jeffersonville, tearing a path northward near Callicoon Center, hitting the Hahn Road area the hardest, where Apple Pond Farm and an adjacent property lost entire barns, trees, roofing and a 180-foot-tall windmill. The storm then churned through mostly uninhabited forest until the Callicoon/Rockland town border, where it continued to fell large trees, rip apart roof coverings and down utility lines.

"The tornado ended its 10-mile path of destruction right behind us," said District 3 Legislator Michael Brooks, gesturing to the hill above the Roscoe-Rockland Community Center, where local property owners gathered to receive assistance and guidance Thursday. "Thankfully there were no injuries or deaths, but there certainly was a good deal of damage, and we want to help folks recover from this devastating event."

"While we can call ourselves blessed that no lives were lost, many of our friends and families will still require significant assistance," agreed NYS Assemblywoman Aileen Gunther. "Our community has bravely come together during this challenging time, and I especially want to thank Callicoon Town Supervisor Tom Bose and Rockland Town Supervisor Rob Eggleton for their quick response and devotion toward helping those affected. Until every family is back on their feet and safe in their homes, I will not stop fighting for resources to expedite and ease recovery efforts."

"I applaud the work performed over the last several days by Sullivan County emergency responders, DPW workers, local elected officials, and utility crews. Moving forward, I am advocating for State and Federal assistance to help rebuild our communities. Additionally, we need to make changes to reclassify damage thresholds to ensure that emergency aid is readily available for communities in need following devastating storms," said New York State Senator Peter Oberacker.

"Earlier this week, I visited impacted areas in Sullivan County to assess the damage and offer my support to those affected," Congressman Marcus Molinaro shared. "I am continuing to work with local officials and emergency responders to ensure that our communities receive the resources and assistance they need to recover and rebuild. We will work tirelessly to ensure that Sullivan County comes back stronger."

"As a contractor myself, I know how expensive it can be just to

replace a roof or windows, let alone entire buildings," said District 5 Legislator George Conklin, who represents the Town of Callicoon on the County Legislature. "While we may not qualify for the kind of State and Federal assistance rendered after hurricanes and floods, I guarantee to the people I serve that we'll look under every rock for aid that can ease this totally unexpected financial and mental burden."

"I'm proud of the cooperation between four different levels of government, and I'm even prouder of all the emergency workers, firefighters, police officers and everyone else in the community who helped each other out during and after this storm," affirmed Legislature Chairman Robert A. Doherty. "Thanks also to Congressman Marc Molinaro for joining me in touring the damage. Sullivan County will repair, rebuild and bounce back!"

Property owners directly impacted by the tornado have a number of avenues to explore for assistance:

NYS Department of Financial Services Consumer Assistance Staff will be available to answer questions regarding filing for homeowners insurance from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. on Friday, April 28 at the Callicoon Town Hall, 19 Legion St, Jeffersonville.

Sullivan County Division of Public Works has placed rolloff containers for tornado-related construction and demolition (C&D) waste ONLY. They are located at the Callicoon Town Highway Barn, 31 Wahl Road, Jeffersonville, and next to the Roscoe-Rockland Fire Station, 1964 Old Route 17, Roscoe. The containers will remain at these sites through at least Friday, May 5.

Sullivan County's Monticello Transfer Station (91 Landfill Drive, Monticello), Rockland Transfer Station (131 Overlook Drive, Livingston Manor) and Ferndale Transfer Station (78 Lt. JG Brender Highway, Ferndale) will accept tornado-related construction and demolition (C&D) waste with no tipping fees. Property owners and contractors delivering such debris will need to provide proof of origin from the towns of Callicoon or Rockland - utility bills, driver's licenses or other documents stating the address of the originating property are acceptable

Homeowners may be eligible for up to \$35,000 in County-funded repair assistance from RUPCO. Contact Frank Robusto at 845-331-9860, ext. 320 or frobusto@rupco.org.

Data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention shows that as many as 1 in 5 children and adolescents in the United States have a mental, behavioral, or emotional disorder, but only

about 20% of this population ever receives care from a specialized mental health provider.

Sullivan County has the highest rate of disconnected youth and additional mental health related issues in the region. The statistics are as alarming as they are staggering.

Sullivan 180 is using May to promote several trainings to help our community in supporting our neighbors, family and friends; and our youth who may be struggling. These workshops can be brought to your neighborhood, church, school, business or civic group. Connect with us about:

Naloxone "Narcan" Training: This training teaches participants how to recognize the signs of an opioid overdose and administer the opioid overdose reversal Naloxone. Anyone can be trained in this program.

QPR: Just as people trained in CPR and the Heimlich Maneuver help save thousands of lives each year, people trained in QPR learn how to recognize the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to question, persuade, and refer someone to help. Anyone can be trained in QPR.

Resilience Film Screening: The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope. This film provides a deeper understanding of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) and dives into cutting edge research on toxic stress. Host a screen with Q&A.

Youth Mental Health First Aid: This program was created to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health or

addictions challenge or is in crisis. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Topics include anxiety, depression, substance use, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (including ADHD), and eating disorders.

Sari Feldman is considered one of the most important figures in the American library system. After graduating from Fallsburg Central School in 1970, she earned her B.A. in English from Binghamton University and an M.S. in Library Science from the University of Wisconsin, Madison. Her career as a public librarian spanned over forty years. She has worked for the Cleveland Public Library in Ohio, Onondaga County Public Library in New York, and Cook Memorial Library in Illinois. But most importantly, she served as the Director of the Cuyahoga County Public Library in Ohio for sixteen years. During her tenure as director, her library was considered one of the most well-run in the country. It even earned the prestigious Library Journal 5-Star recognition for ten consecutive years.





Ms. Feldman carried her passion for the written word beyond the bookshelves. She served as president of both the American Library Association from 2009 to 2010 and the Public Library Association from 2015 to 2016. As president, she represented America's libraries on a national and global scale. She was even a guest of honor during trips overseas with the U.S. State Department and various international organizations. Currently, she is a board member for Overdrive and RB Media, a policy fellow for the Washington Office of the American Library Association, and a columnist for Publishers Weekly.

Sari has been described as thoughtful, intelligent, and optimistic by many. But most of all, she will carry a legacy that will be exceedingly difficult to match. Public libraries around the country will be forever grateful for her relentless devotion to protecting our right to free and accessible books.

# DEC Forest Rangers -Week in Review Recent Statewide Forest Ranger Actions

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Forest Rangers respond to search and rescue incidents statewide. Working with other state agencies, local emergency response organizations, and volunteer search and rescue groups, Forest Rangers locate and extract lost, injured, or distressed people from across New York State.

#### **Prescribed Fires:**


On April 12, Forest Rangers and other DEC personnel completed an interagency prescribed burn of approximately 75 acres in the town of Groveland. The burn at Sonyea State Forest included short grasses and brush. Because the targeted land is positioned between Groveland Correctional Facility and Interstate 390, smoke management was a focus of the successful efforts.

On April 14, Forest Rangers and DEC personnel completed an interagency prescribed burn of approximately 45 acres in the town of Cameron. The burn at Helmer Creek Wildlife Management Area included short grasses as part of the effort to protect the timber rattlesnake habitat.

On April 20, Forest Rangers and DEC personnel completed an interagency prescribed burn with Central Pine Barrens and Brookhaven National Laboratory of approximately 27.5 acres of land in the town of Riverhead.

On April 21, Forest Rangers and DEC wildlife staff completed a prescribed burn of approximately 26 acres of land in the town of Lysander.

Prescribed fires help prevent the spread of invasive species and reduce the risk of uncontrolled wildfires. More information and video about prescribed fires is available at DEC's Facebook page.

KINGSTON, NY - Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger has announced a new Ulster County Climate Corps internship program to give young people hands-on experience developing climate policies and programs. The Ulster County Climate Corps is a paid, project-based summer internship program. Participants will be assigned to

various County departments to help implement the County government's climate and sustainability initiatives. The program's six projects are aligned with the New York State Climate Smart Communities program actions as well as County Executive Metzger's Executive Order to meet the goals of the NYS Climate Act.

This new program comes at a critical time as Ulster County positions itself to capitalize on the benefits of a green economy and attract thousands of new jobs in the manufacturing, buildings, transportation, renewable energy, and other green economy sectors.

"As we face the challenges of climate change, we must empower the next generation of leaders to build a more sustainable and resilient future," said Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger. "The Climate Corps offers young people a unique opportunity to gain hands-on experience in developing climate policies and programs while contributing to the County's efforts to meet our aggressive climate targets. I encourage young people who are passionate about the environment and public service to apply for this exciting program."

This internship program is part of a broader effort to recruit and cultivate the next generation for green careers and public service, reflecting the talents and diversity of our community. Interns will gain professional and practical experience in government, supplemented by skillbased training and guest speakers on topics related to the environment, project management, and public administration. Interns will also have opportunities to participate in community engagement and fieldwork.

The projects include creating a Climate Justice Outreach Plan, supporting the Green Business Champions program, greening office equipment life cycles through sustainable purchasing, electrifying HVAC systems at all county buildings, creating a Climate Change Adaptation Annex for the County's Emergency Management Plan, and creating a Climate Initiatives Dashboard with visual data and resources.

The program pays \$17/hr and requires a commitment of a minimum of two days per week, up to a possibility of four days per week. Applications are now open and being accepted on a rolling basis, with a limited number of positions available. Participants must be age 16 & up, with no requirement that they are students. 



# **Governor Hochul and Mayor** Adams Launch New \$15 **Million Effort** to Build All-Electric, Affordable Homes in NYC

Governor Kathy Hochul and Mayor Eric Adams today launched the Future Housing Initiative, a new partnership investing \$15 million to fast-track the creation of 3,000 energy-efficient and all-electric affordable homes in New York City. The new effort is a significant step toward goals outlined in the state Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act - including reducing greenhouse gas emissions 85 percent by 2050 and delivering 35-40 percent of the benefits of clean energy investments to disadvantaged communities - as well as the city's green building goals under Local Law 97.

"With the Future Housing Initiative, we're taking a major step forward in our commitment to ensure a more sustainable, affordable, and equitable future for New Yorkers," Governor Hochul said. "I'm proud to partner with Mayor Adams on this critical effort, which will help us reach our nation-leading climate goals, improve access to affordable housing in our communities, and

build a healthier, greener New York for all."

Mayor Eric Adams said, "Since day one, our administration's north star has been connecting New Yorkers to safe, high-quality, affordable homes. This new partnership will do all of that and give us the tools to do it even more quickly. In New York, we are tackling the climate crisis head-on, and I want to thank Governor Hochul for working with us to deliver the greener, cleaner, more

prosperous future New Yorkers deserve."

Formally titled the New Construction Future Housing Initiative, this effort is the result of an expanded memorandum of understanding between the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) and the New York City Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD). The initiative aims to streamline the delivery of development financing and grants to affordable housing projects currently in HPD's new construction pipeline. Funding will cover the incremental costs of implementing high-performance, all-electric Future Homes standards, such as electrification of hot water and heating systems in design and construction to provide energy savings, resiliency, and improved air quality for future resi-

Funded through NYSERDA's \$6 billion Clean Energy Fund, the Future Housing Initiative offers building owners and developers up to \$10,000 per unit and up to \$1.5 million per project to fund the construction of high-performance, all-electric multifamily buildings that will achieve "Passive House" certification, the gold standard for sustainable construction, with drastically reduced energy use and carbon emissions. Development teams will also receive technical assistance support to facilitate the necessary design work. The program will support up to 30 projects that encompass approximately 3,000 dwelling units.

By creating a smoother process for developers and providing technical assistance and incentives as part of the financing cycle with HPD, we are advancing energy efficiency and electrification while supporting development of much-needed affordable housing for New Yorkers."

New York State Homes and Community Renewal

Commissioner RuthAnne Visnauskas said, "Today's announcement continues Governor Hochul's commitment to making environmentally sustainable affordable housing available to all New Yorkers. The \$15 million Future Housing Initiative will facilitate the development of up to 30 clean, electrified, and affordable buildings for New York City's residents. This program, along with HCR's Clean Energy Initiative, which is providing streamlined access to affordable housing finance opportunities to developers who can produce energy-efficient, all-electric affordable units, will ensure New York continues to lead the way in realizing a decarbonized housing stock. Together these programs will not only benefit those who will be able to call modern, resilient apartments their home, but will enable entire communities to enjoy improved air quality from reduced building emissions."

Chief Housing Officer Jessica Katz said, "New York City must ensure that our transition away from a fossil-fueled economy is fair and equitable. The Future Housing Initiative advances the administration's commitment to fast-tracking sustainability and healthier living conditions for affordable housing residents. Thank you to NYSERDA for your partnership on this essential

effort.'

Chief Climate Officer and New York City Department of Environmental Protection Rohit T. Aggarwala said, "All of New York is committed to fighting climate change, and we are providing the support needed to create energy-efficient homes. The Future Housing Initiative will speed up the creation of 3,000 new, carbon-neutral, affordable homes and, through PlaNYC, we will develop a public solar financing program for existing oneto-four family, low-income homeowners in environmental justice communities. New York is moving aggressively on all fronts to reduce our carbon footprint."

Applications for round one of Future Housing Initiative funding with \$7.5 million available open today through HPD and will be accepted through June 1, 2023. A second round will follow in

Buildings are one of the largest sources of greenhouse gas emissions in New York City, making up two-thirds of all greenhouse gas emissions generated within the five boroughs. Integrating energy efficiency and electrification in affordable housing developments reduces carbon emissions and results in more sustainable, healthy, and comfortable homes.

The initiative builds upon an earlier partnership to advance electrification in HPD's preservation pipeline by financing retrofits in existing multifamily buildings. Announced in 2021, the original agreement between NYSERDA and HPD provided deep incentives through the HPD Retrofit Electrification Pilot to support building electrification and energy efficiency retrofits in multifamily buildings in HPD's preservation pipeline with poorly performing systems where electrification is a big win. This pilot is expected to upgrade approximately 1,200 affordable homes. The partnership combines NYSERDA's clean energy and technical expertise and HPD's affordable housing financing and development expertise with a focus on driving the design, construction, and operation of clean and resilient carbon neutral buildings in support of Governor Hochul's goal to achieve two million climate friendly homes by 2030.

The Future Housing Initiative also delivers on Mayor Adams' commitments in PlaNYC: Getting Sustainability Done and Housing Our Neighbors: A Blueprint for Housing and Homelessness to improve the health and safety of New Yorkers through housing, including by promoting electrification and sustainability standards for newly constructed, affordable housing. Together, this work will bring the city's affordable housing creation efforts more closely in line with decarbonization goals and benefit residents through lower energy costs, healthier living



# Wrapping up Another Week in Washington - Congressman Pat Ryan

As we start off another productive week, I wanted to give you an update on all that I've been doing on behalf of the Hudson and Delaware Valleys!

#### PROTECTING OUR SENIORS, WORKING FAMILIES, AND **VETERANS**

In combat, it was my duty to make sure we left no one behind. Last VISITING WITH TUXEDO SCHOOL week, I took to the House Floor to make it known that the cuts in "Default on America Act" leave far too many Americans behind; they target our seniors, our working families and our veterans, those who we should protect the most.

The U.S. Department of Transportation's new Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Discretionary Grant Program, established by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, will provide \$2.5 billion over five years to a wide range of applicants, including cities, counties, local governments, and Tribes. This round of funding makes up to \$700 million from fiscal years 2022 and 2023 funding available to strategically deploy EV charging and other alternative vehicle-fueling infrastructure projects in publicly accessible locations in urban and rural communities, as well as along designated Alternative Fuel Corridors (AFCs). EDA Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance (PWEAA) supports bottom-up strategies that build on regional assets to spur economic growth and resiliency. EDA encourages its grantees throughout the country to develop initiatives that present new ideas and creative approaches to advance economic prosperity in distressed communities.

The Department of Justice opened the applications for numerous grants for its Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) program to hire community police, develop and test innovative policing strategies, and provide training and technical assistance to community members, local government leaders, and all levels of law enforcement.

The Industrial Demonstrations Program opened grants funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to accelerate decarbonization projects in energy-intensive industries and provide American manufacturers a competitive advantage in the emerging global clean energy economy.

Environmental Justice Thriving Communities Grantmaking program is funded by the Biden Administration's Inflation Reduction Act and will invest in America and expedite investments to reduce pollution in disadvantaged communities.

EPA plans to award cooperative agreement(s) to passthrough entities (referred to as Grantmakers by the program) who will collaborate with EPA to design and build their own processes to receive and evaluate competitive community project applications from communities for EJ Thriving Communities Subgrant activities. These activities consist of assessment, planning, and/or project development activities addressing local environmental and/or public health issues. Grantmakers will provide EJ Thriving Communities Subgrants (i.e., subawards) to Eligible Subrecipients. Due May 31.

Local Agriculture Market Program (LAMP) grants with USDA support the development, coordination, and expansion of direct producer-to-consumer marketing; local and regional food markets and enterprises; and value-added agricultural products. Due May 2.

Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program provides grants up to \$125,000 per year for five years to community coalitions to strengthen the infrastructure among local partners to create and sustain a reduction in local youth substance use.

# **Supporting Legislation to Limit Wasteful Spending and Grow Our Economy**

I voted in support of the Limit, Save, Grow Act, which works to responsibly address the current debt limit crisis while prioritizing responsible spending on bipartisan priorities. # **Defending American Manufacturers and Protecting American Jobs**

#### Rep. Tenney speaks on the House Floor to defend American Manufacturers & Depoil US Trade Laws

In June 2022, President Biden issued an unprecedented Emergency Declaration, which allowed Chinese solar product manufacturers to flood our economy with unfairly traded solar products with no additional tariffs for two years. Motivated by the "Green New Deal Agenda," this rule will have serious ramifications for American jobs spanning a wide range of

industries that rely on U.S. trade laws to fairly compete with China.

This week, I voted in favor of a resolution that I championed to repeal the Biden Administration's harmful Solar Emergency Declaration. By allowing Chinese solar product manufacturers to flood our economy with unfairly traded products, Biden's rule undermines our trade laws and the principle of fair competition. The Senate must take up this resolution immediately and join us in standing up for American workers and businesses.

Transparency and a well-informed public are vital components of our self-governing Constitutional Republic! I'm committed to restoring transparency to government, which is why I explain every vote I take on the House floor.

Some of the key bills we considered this week are explained below. To read more about these votes and see the full list with explanations of all the legislation considered this week by the House of Representatives, please click here.

I voted "Yes" on H.J. Res. 39, Disapproving the rule submitted by the Department of Commerce relating to "Procedures Covering Suspension of Liquidation, Duties and Estimated Duties in Accord With Presidential Proclamation 10414. This resolution would repeal the Biden Administration's emergency proclamation to allow the import of solar products from China with no additional tariffs for two years. Last year, an American solar manufacturer petitioned the Commerce Department to investigate whether China was circumventing tariffs on solar products by shipping them through multiple countries in Southeast Asia. Before that investigation was finished, President Biden issued a proclamation to allow the imports of unfairly traded solar products from China. At the end of last year, it was discovered by the Commerce Department that China was indeed violating U.S. trade laws. I strongly support upholding our nation's trade laws and holding bad actors, such as China, accountable for attempts to hurt American small businesses and workers. President Biden's emergency proclamation would do just the opposite. His unprecedented and dangerous move is a boon for Chinese solar manufacturers and the Chinese Communist Party that controls them. I will always stand with American manufacturers and jobs, not the Chinese and President Biden's woke "Green New Deal Agenda". This resolution passed the House by a vote of 221-202.

I voted "No" on H. Con. Res. 30, Directing the President, pursuant to section 5(c) of the War Powers Resolution, to remove all United States Armed Forces, other than United States Armed Forces assigned to protect the United States Embassy, from Somalia. This resolution would require the President to remove U.S. Armed Forces from Somalia within 365 days of its passage under the War Powers Resolution. Currently, the U.S. has approximately 500 troops stationed in Somalia that are primarily focused on providing intelligence and training the Somalian troops in their important counterterrorism efforts. With the support and training of U.S. troops, Somalia has had great success in combatting al-Shabaab, al-Qaeda's greatest affiliate, which has killed over a dozen Americans and countless others, including 67 killed in the 2013 Westgate mall attack in Nairobi and 150 mainly Christian students at the 2015 Garissa University College attack. In fact, since May 2022, when this deployment occurred, Somalian troops have retaken more land controlled by al-Shabaab than in the last five years combined. (Contd. Pg. 57)

I am strongly against forever wars and believe that Congress must always hold the executive accountable for delivering long-term strategies for our global counterterror operations with clear benchmarks for success or failure. However, prohibiting the United States from maintaining this small support force without a sufficient replacement or long-term plan in place will only serve to allow a resurgence of al-Shabaab that could destabilize the region and threaten the United States and our allies. This bill failed to pass the House by a vote of 102-321.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 2811, the Limit, Save, Grow Act of 2023. Americans are currently facing an economic crisis due to persistently high inflation, rising interest rates, and debt at unsustainable levels. In response this bill responsibly addresses the debt ceiling while limiting wasteful spending, saving taxpayer dollars, and growing our economy. This bill will lead to over \$3.6 billion in taxpayer savings over the next 10 years, bringing us back to the 2022 federal spending baseline. Then moving forward this bill will limit future federal spending increases to 1% annually. Finally, this legislation will also repeal President Biden's student loan giveaway, new army of IRS auditors, and "Green New Deal" runaway spending. It is time that President Biden stops his refusal to negotiate and comes to the negotiating table to work with Republicans on a path forward to economic stability and growth. The inability to get spending under control now threatens our ability to keep caring for our most vulnerable in the future and to provide an economic climate that ensures robust opportunity for all. This bill passed the House by a vote of 217-215.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 1339, the Precision Agriculture Satellite Connectivity Act. New York's 24th Congressional District is the top agriculture district in the northeast, truly putting food on all our plates. As our agricultural economy continues to advance, it becomes ever more reliant on technology and data, which is often provided through satellite providers. This bill would require the FCC to review its rules concerning fixed, mobile, and earth exploration satellite services to recommend changes to promote precision agriculture. By updating these processes, we will give farmers the data they need to reduce their needed fertilizer and efficiently manage their land. The bill passed the House by a vote of 409-11.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 1353, the Advanced Local Emergency Response Telecommunications Parity Act. Throughout the nation, and especially in rural areas, many emergency responders rely on satellites to communicate with themselves and residents. However, some areas of the country do not have reliable access to these lifesaving technologies. In response, this bill streamlines FCC red tape and provides certainty for satellite communications providers who want to provide customers with access to emergency services where and when it is otherwise unavailable. This bill passed the House by a vote of 422-1.

I voted "Yes" on H. Res. 90, Demanding that the Government of the PRC and the CCP immediately release Mark Swidan, an American citizen who was detained unjustly and is sentenced to be executed by the Chinese government after his driver and translator were found in possession of illegal drugs. However, Mark Swidan was not in the country during the alleged offense and no drugs were found on him or in his hotel room. To this day the Chinese government has still not provided any credible evidence to back up its criminal charges and is merely attempting to use this American citizen for leverage. This resolution calls on the

Biden administration to prioritize efforts to secure Mr. Swidan's release and condemns the Chinese government and Chinese Community Party for its poor treatment of Mr. Swidan. I continue to keep Mr. Swidan in my thoughts and prayers, and I hope his quick release can be secured. This resolution passed the House of Representatives by a vote of 418-0.

I voted "Yes" on H. Res. 311, Encouraging the expansion and strengthening of the Abraham Accords to urge other nations to normalize relations with Israel and ensure that existing agreements reap tangible security and economic benefits for the citizens of those countries and all peoples in the region. This resolution recognizes Israel's 75th anniversary and celebrates the historic progress made by the Abraham Accords in creating a lasting peace in the Middle East. Under the Trump administration, Israel and multiple Middle Eastern and North African states signed the Abraham Accords, which finally established diplomatic relations between Israel and the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, Morocco, and Sudan. This agreement set up a strong foundation of regional dialogue and cooperation, making it the most significant development towards Middle East peace in over 25 years. As a member of the Abraham Accords Caucus in Congress I am honored to support this resolution and continue to support the longstanding friendship and alliance between the U.S. and Israel, our greatest ally in the Middle East. This resolution passed the House of Representatives by a vote of 401-19.

# UC CARES II Small Business Grant Awards Announced

KINGSTON, NY - Recipients of the Ulster County CARES II Small Business Grant award program have been announced, with 42 Ulster County small businesses and nonprofit organizations receiving grants. This second round of funding is designed to support and expand the operations of local small businesses and organizations with 25 or fewer employees and provide muchneeded relief from COVID-related economic stressors.

A wide variety of expenses including rent, payroll, equipment, and fixed assets are eligible for reimbursement through the program, with a minimum award amount of \$5,000 and a maximum award amount of \$35,000 provided directly to businesses and organizations.

Over 270 applications were reviewed by a six-person review committee composed of County Legislators John Gavaris, Kevin Roberts, and Chris Hewitt, along with three county employees appointed by the Ulster County Executive's Office. The Ulster County Economic Development Alliance reviewed the committee's recommendations and formally approved them on April 11.

"I want to congratulate the more than 40 small businesses and nonprofits throughout the County that received these awards," said Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger. "In the aftermath of the pandemic, the funding will provide financial relief and assistance where it is most needed, as well as the opportunity to support the growth and vitality of these businesses and organizations, especially when it comes to creating and retaining jobs throughout the county."

"The recipients of the CARES II small business grants demonstrated that the pandemic drastically impacted their businesses," said County Legislator Chris Hewitt, District 21, "and they each have strong plans to keep their businesses and organizations successful into the future."

Hewitt said the review process revealed local businesses are in need of major support as they recover from the pandemic, and that he and his colleagues would continue working to support these businesses.

"The applications made it clear that the need for funding far surpassed the amount available in the program's budget," Hewitt continued. "My legislative colleagues and I will continue to find opportunities to strengthen local businesses and nonprofit organizations."

The CARES II Small Business Assistance Program is modeled after the successful CARES I program that concluded in early 2023. The first round of the program reimbursed businesses for nearly \$930,000.00 of eligible expenses made from December 23, 2021 - October 31, 2022, and provided direct financial assistance to 34 small businesses and organizations across a variety of sectors. Over half of those grants went to women and minority-owned businesses, and as a direct result of this funding, those businesses added 38 new full-time jobs and 27 part-time jobs, on top of the 82 full- and part-time jobs they retained.


