## LOOKING BACK

Meat is like the star in a show. It is also the most expensive item in our food budget. Very soon now, hunting season will open and our hunters will be bringing home the venison.

I have a couple of venison recipes that I would like to share. I found them in my Aunt Bill's recipe book

### **Venison Steak**

2 venison steaks, 8 oz. each salt and pepper to taste
1/2 lemon
1/2 tsp Oregano
1/4 pound butter
6 oz. Madeira or Italian wine chopped parsley
flour to dredge

Prepare venison steaks. Dust with salt and pepper. Squeeze lemon on steaks and put oregano on both sides of steaks. Dredge them in flour. Put skillet with butter on the stove, and when butter is hot, add steaks. Fry until about medium. When ready, take skillet off fire and add wine. Put back on stove and simmer about five minutes. Serve on a platter, pouring the hot sauce over the steaks. Sprinkle with parsley and serve hot with your favorite potatoes and vegetables.

## Bittersweet -You'll Love it, or You'll Hate

During the fall season, Bittersweet puts on a display throughout our area, few other plants can rival. The deep yellow skin of their berries bursts to reveal an orange jewel within. Arts and crafts folks have fallen in love with bittersweet using the Bittersweet vine to construct wreaths or as we did years ago, to create beautiful fall centerpieces for our Thanksgiving table.

There are two vines with yellow and orange berries commonly called "bit-

berries commonly called "bittersweet." They look very
much alike. One, a harmless
vine indigenous to North
America with smooth stems,
is Celastrus scandens, also
called "American bittersweet"
plant or "false bittersweet."
The other, an exotic vine that
is among North America's
most invasive plants and
whose stem bears blunt
thorns, is Celastrus orbiculatus, or "oriental bittersweet"

vine. Another way to distinguish between American and oriental types is by discerning the location of their berries: the berries of American bittersweet plants appear at the tips of the vines only, while those of the oriental type grow along the vine. In both species the vine can become quite large and reach to 20 feet or more. Stems will trail if there is no support. The young stems are green and hairless, turning brown and woody with age.

The dark green leaves of bittersweet are stalked, oval, with sharp teeth, smooth on both sides, with a pointed tip, and borne alternately along the stem. They are about twice as long as wide. There is a small stipule at the base of the leaf stalk.

During the late spring and early summer flowers will appear. They are small, about 1/4 inch wide, 5-parted, yellowish-greenish, with a cup-shaped calyx with 5 triangular tips, shorter than the petals which are a greenish-white and spread outward with the tips reflecting backward. Petal edges are wavy-ragged. Male flowers have 5 stamens with white filaments and yellow anthers. In female flowers, the style is yellowish-green and slender rising from an enlarged yellow-green 3-sectioned ovary. There are 5 false stamens (Staminodes). A fertile flower will produce a round green seed capsule which, as it matures, changes color to end up a brownish-orange. The capsule then splits open into 3 sections and reveals a bright red three sectioned berry that contains the seeds, of which there are usually 2 per section of the capsule.

The berries are toxic to humans, however, Bittersweet berries are especially enticing to birds who in turn, disperse the seeds after eating the berries. The winter birds and other forest creatures love the Bittersweet berries! Should germination of a bittersweet seed take place at the base of a tree, the potential of that seed could very quickly destroy the tree. As the young plant makes its way to the top of the tree, the bittersweet vine can reach up to four inches in diameteras it grows around a tree in a process called girdling. It will wrap so tightly that tree will be strangled.

Bittersweet vine is one of the terribly invasive plants considered by many to be an environmental menace as they choke out native plants. Adding to the problem is the fact that, invasive plants or not, Bittersweet's vines are so captivating that they still entice people to propagate them as a landscaping element.

If the power of the beauty of the bittersweet still lures you into growing it on your property, please take extreme precautions against the spread of this highly invasive plant. Keep it confined to one area of your property and prune it often. And most importantly, do not allow bittersweet to grow on any tree whose health you value.




## Legacy Mysterious Book Report No. 61 Mysterious Book Report No. 425

If you're a fan of WWII historical fiction, as the MBR is, and lament the passing of the late Philip Kerr, as the MBR does,

we'd like to bring your attention to the long-running, meticulously well-researched and award-winning Billy Boyle series by author James R. Benn.

In his newest and just released 17th adventure, *The Red Horse*, (Soho Press, \$27.95, 336 pages, ISBN 978-1-64129-100-2), it's shortly after D-Day and Paris had just been liberated. But Captain Billy Boyle—the former Boston homicide detective attached to General Eisenhower's staff-and his friend, Lt. Piotr "Kaz" Kazimierz, are both casualties of the fight to retake the city. Both men have been flown back to England, where they're hospitalized at St. Albans, a secret convalescent hospital in the English countryside, where those who were engaged in clandestine warfare and espionage go to recuperate from their mental and physical wounds in a secure environment, where the secrets they carry will be safe from prying by the enemy. Kaz has a life-threatening heart problem and Billy Boyle is hallucinating due to stress, plus mental and physical exhaustion from the overuse of methamphetamines to stay alert in the days leading up to the battle for the City of Lights, as Paris is called. In addition Billy's lover, Diana



Seaton, a British espionage agent helping the French underground, has been taken by the SS and sent to the Ravensbrück concentration camp for women, along with Angelika, Kaz's sister and a member of the Polish

Underground.

Only a few days after arriving at St. Albans, Billy sees a senior intelligence officer and patient named Holland, who's about to be released back to active duty, fall to his death from the St. Albans clock tower. The authorities are listing his death as a suicide . . . but Billy thinks he saw two people up there on the tower in the moments before Holland fell. He can't be certain though, because he was still hallucinating at the time.

Then, shortly after a medically induced sleep cure has Billy on the road to recovery, two more murders take place in quick succession and he's in an almost impossible situation; trying to avoid suspicious hospital administrators and figure out who's the killer, while not falling victim to him and, oh yeah, regaining his own health, in this twisted, suspenseful and surprising WWII mystery that'll leave readers hunting for all the other novels in this outstanding series. Summer is just not long enough.





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

## **Pumpkin Apple Muffins with Streusel Topping**

2-1/2 cups all-purpose flour 2 cups sugar 1 tablespoon pumpkin pie spice 1 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 large Eggs, lightly beaten 1 cup canned pumpkin 1/2 cup vegetable oil 2 cups finely chopped peeled apples

## **Topping**

1/4 cup sugar 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1 tablespoon butter

In a large bowl, combine flour, sugar, pumpkin pie spice, baking soda and salt. Combine eggs, pumpkin and oil; stir into dry ingredients just until moistened. Fold in apples. Fill 18 greased or paper-lined muffin cups three-fourths full. For topping, combine sugar, flour and cinnamon. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs; sprinkle 1 teaspoon over each muffin.

Bake at 350° until a toothpick comes out clean, 30-35 minutes. Cool in pan 10 minutes before removing to a wire

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




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## LETTER TO THE EDITOR: Remembering Veterans On this Veterans Day in 2023 we extend our appreciation

On this Veterans Day in 2023 we extend our appreciation and thoughts to Americans who are serving in our military and to all veterans. We also wish to acknowledge the veterans of the Jones and Moskowitz families who served during major wars from the Civil War to the War On Terror.

During the Civil War 1st Sargent John B. Jones (Elizabeth's grandfather) and Corporal William E. Jones (Elizabeth's great uncle) were in the 5th New York Cavalry Regiment from upstate New York from 1861 to 1865. They fought in many battles, including the Orange Court House, Brandy Station, The Wilderness, Spotsylvania Court House, Cold Harbor and Gettysburg.

Donald's grandfather, Pvt. Max Moskowitz, served in the U.S. Cavalry (Roughriders) in 1898 during the Spanish American War; and was a government inspector during WWII, monitoring a number of manufacturing plants in New England.

During World War I Alton Christmas Jones (Elizabeth's father) and William Howard Jones (uncle) served in the USMC and saw action at Belleau Wood, Chateau-Thierry, Aisne-Marne, and Meusse-Argonne. Alton suffered some gas exposure during one of the battles. William Howard received the U.S. Silver Star and the French Croix De Guerre medals for his "action at Blanc Mont Ridge on October 3, 1918 where he held off a German attack using a machine pistol."

Donald's father, Sidney Moskowitz, was a machinist who repaired ships at the Charlestown, MA Naval Shipyard during WWII. Elizabeth's cousin, Barney O'Neil, was a U.S. Army infantryman who landed in Normandy in June 1944. Bob Rosenblatt (Donald's relative) served in the Army at the end of WWII.

Barry Rowe (Donald's brother-in-law) was a Commander in the U.S. Navy who served during the Korean War and the Vietnam War.

John Jones and Edward Persson Jones (Elizabeth's brothers) served in the late 50s and early to mid 60s, John U.S. Army and Edward, USMC. Donald Moskowitz was an E5 in the Navy in the 50s and then was a Vietnam era veteran in the 60s serving as a Navy officer on 13 ships. Donald has continued his service to veterans through participation in the American Legion, Department of New Hampshire, having served as the Department (State) Treasurer and a Department Vice Commander. Additionally, he served as a Commander and Adjutant at the American Legion post in Londonderry NH. Robert Nichol (Elizabeth's cousin) was a platoon leader in Vietnam from 1969 to 1970. He was in the 1st Infantry Division and the 101st Infantry Division. During his Vietnam service he was awarded the Silver Star, two Bronze Stars, and two Purple Hearts.

Michael Gerard (Donald's and Elizabeth's son-in-law) was an Airman First Class, USAF in the early 80s. Jeffrey Ammons (Donald's nephew) served as an Army officer during the War On Terror.

Anton Olsson, Elizabeth's second cousin, served on board a corvette in the Swedish Navy.

We must continue to remember all of our veterans who have served our country in times of peace and war. Veterans appreciate being recognized in public for their service to our great country, and a greeting of "thank you for your service" goes a long way in showing that appreciation.

From wampum belts and hand-woven baskets to detailed clothing and authentic log cabins, you'll discover the fascinating work of the state's first inhabitants. With interactive exhibits, walking trails, and seasonal events, there's much to be explored!

Masks are encouraged, but optional in most settings per New York State guidelines. Individual businesses or attractions may require mask wearing. Call ahead and check websites and social media to make sure attractions and amenities are open and available.

Walk through a reconstructed Mohawk Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) longhouse to see replicated artifacts and experience Iroquois culture as part of the ongoing Native Peoples of New York exhibit at the New York State Museum in Albany. The exhibit also includes three dioramas depicting the various ways of life of New York Native American tribes and a model of a Mohawk Iroquois Village. For a firsthand look at the impactful traditions and sense of community of Native People today, browse the Contemporary Native American Art Collection at the museum. The museum is open Tuesday-Sunday from 9:30 am to 5 pm; Albany; Admission is free. The suggested donation is \$5 per person and \$10 per family.

## Seneca-Iroquois National Museum (Chautauqua-Allegheny)

From distinct collections and guest speakers to memorable exhibits and special events, the Seneca-Iroquois National Museum, located in the new Onöhsagwë:de' Cultural Center in Salamanca, proudly showcases Seneca-Iroquois culture. Experience a traditional lifestyle as you wander through an authentic Seneca log cabin, learning the importance of lacrosse as a "medicine game" in the All the Medicines exhibit. Beadwork, basketry, pottery, and corn husk items are just some of the pieces available at the museum's new online store. The museum is open Monday - Friday 10 am-4:30 pm; Salamanca; Admission is \$11 for adults, \$8 for veterans, seniors, and college students, and \$7 for children; Children six and under are free; guided tours are \$20.

### **Iroquois Museum (Central New York)**

Honor Iroquois history and culture through art at the Iroquois Museum in Howes Cave. The museum, built to resemble an Iroquois elm bark longhouse, is an engaging center for learning for all ages. At the children's area, youngsters can participate in interactive exhibits, including an extension of this year's feature exhibition, Oil & Water (April 1 - November 30, 2023) After exploring indoors, head outside to the 45-acre Nature Park with trails, wildlife, and two 19th-century log homes. The museum is open May 1 - October 31 Tuesday-Saturday 10am-5pm and Sunday 12pm-5pm, and in April and November Thursday-Saturday 10am-4pm and Sundays 12pm-4pm; it will close at the end of November and reopen on April 1, 2023. Howe Caves; Admission is \$8 for adults; \$6.50 for seniors age 62 and older; \$6.50 for students age 13-17; \$5 for children age 5-12; Children five and under are free. (Contd. Pg 18)

## November's Native American Heritage Month (From Pg. 17) National Museum of the American Indian

(New York City)

Showcasing the important work and traditions of Native Americans, the National Museum of the American Indian, a Smithsonian museum, is located within the stately Alexander Hamilton US Custom House at Bowling Green in Lower Manhattan. See how the work of 10 contemporary artists was influenced by their heritage at the ongoing Ancestral Connections exhibition. Find fun in the imagiNATIONS Activity Center where you can participate in hands-on activities, like balancing in a kayak or using Mayan Math. Also ongoing, Native New York encompasses 12 places in present-day New York, introducing visitors to the Native nations that call the region home. Stretching from Long Island through New York City and on toward Niagara Falls, it covers pre-Revolutionary War exchanges through contemporary events. Additionally, the permanent exhibit, Infinity of Nations: Art and History in the Collections of the National Museum of the American Indian, presents some 700 works of Native art from throughout North, Central, and South America and highlights the historic importance of many of these iconic pieces. Focal point objects, representing each region, range from an Apsáalooke (Crow) robe illustrated with warriors' exploits to an early Anishinaabe man's outfit complete with headdress, leggings, shirt, sash, and jewelry. The museum is open daily 10am to 5 pm; closed on December 25. Manhattan; Admission is free.



## Fenimore Art Museum (Central New York)

It's no surprise that Cooperstown, a village filled with history and tradition, is home to an expansive Native American art collection. Located in the American Indian Wing of the Fenimore Art Museum, The Thaw Collection of American Indian Art features approximately 850 objects, including pieces like embellished moccasins, detailed jars, woven blankets, and beaded necklaces. From October 7 - December 31, you can view Following the Thread: Navajo Textiles from the Thaw Collection which explores the history and transformation of Diné (Navajo) weaving through a selection of historic textiles from the Thaw Collection. Books about the Thaw Collection, as well as Native American history can be purchased at the museum shop. The lakeside grounds feature two Native American structures, a Seneca log house and a Mohawk bark house, that are open during the summer for special tours. The museum is open April 1-May 26 and October 10-December 31 Tuesday-Sunday 10 am-4 pm, and May 27-October 9 daily 10am-5pm. The museum is closed January 1-March 31. Cooperstown; Admission is \$15 for adults; \$12.50 for seniors; young people 19 and under are free; free admission is always available to members, active military, retired career military personnel, and for those receiving SNAP benefits, up to four people.

## Garvies Point Museum & Preserve (Long Island)

Featuring collections of artifacts and Native American archaeology in exhibits, Garvies Point Museum & Preserve in Glen Cove provides a unique perspective on the early lives of Native Americans. Explore a variety of exhibits including The Seasonal Round that explores Native American life throughout the seasons on what now is Long Island. After exploring indoors, walk the 62 acres of nature trails along the preserve. The museum is open Tuesday-Saturday 10 am-4 pm; The preserve is open seven days a week during daylight hours; Glen Cove; Admission is \$5 for adults; \$3 for children (ages 5-12).

## Ganondagan State Historic Site (Finger Lakes)

Go back in time at the Ganondagan State Historic Site, a National Historic Landmark and the original site of a 17th-century Seneca town, in Victor. The Seneca Art & Cultural Center, located at the Ganondagan State Historic Site, showcases the work and traditions of the Seneca and Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) people. Explore the Hodinöhsö:ni' Women: From the Time of Creation (open until January 14, 2023) exhibit to get a sense of their impressive contributions, and learn about the connection they had with women's rights activists like Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony. The cultural center is open Wednesday-Sunday 9 am-4 pm; the Bark Longhouse Exhibit is open until October 28. Year-round hiking trails are open daily dawn-dusk, weather permitting. Victor; Admission: November 1-April 30: \$6 adults, \$3 seniors, \$1 children 5-11, \$3 children 12-17 and college students; May 1-October 31: \$8 adults, \$4 seniors, and \$2 children 5-11, \$4 children 12-17, and college students. Free for children 4 and under, Friends of Ganondagan members, and Tribal Members with ID.

## Akwesasne Cultural Center and Museum (Adirondacks)

Visit the recently renovated Akwesasne Cultural Center and Museum in Akwesasne to learn about the unique culture of the Kanien\_kehá\_ka (Mohawk). With new exhibits and a modernized look, the museum features images, artifacts, and interactive displays that make history come to life! One ongoing exhibit includes traditional black ash baskets, wampum belts, and a wolf belt, a traditional belt dating back to the 1700s. To incorporate contemporary work, the museum brings in local artisans to exhibit their work. Self-guided and guided tours are available. The Akwesasne Cultural Center also has a library providing literary resources for all ages, activities for families, and free internet access. The library is open Mondays from 9 am to 5 pm, Tuesday-Friday 9am-6pm and Saturday from 10 am to 2 pm. The museum is open Tuesday-Friday from 10 am to 6 pm and Saturday from 10 am to 2 pm; Akwesasne; Donations are greatly appreciated.

## The Wild Center (Adirondacks)

While you're in the Adirondacks, head to The Wild Center in Tupper Lake to check out the Ways of Knowing project. In partnership with the Akwesasne Cultural Center, the Six Nations Iroquois Cultural Center, and the Native American Travelling College, the Ways of Knowing project includes the Haudenosaunee Thanksgiving Address exhibit and film. The exhibits feature the exploration of the natural world, traditional food, and work from artist David Fadden. Indigenous voices are also highlighted in the brand new Climate Solutions-an exhibit that highlights first-hand stories from local individuals working on local climate solutions. Tupper Lake; open daily, from Memorial Day to Indigenous Peoples Day, from 10am-5pm; from Indigenous Peoples Day to March 31 and May 1 to Memorial Day, it is open Friday through Sunday, 10am-5pm; closed during April; admission price varies; free with Tribal ID.



Dedicated to the memory of Kathleen Myers In this thought-provoking illustrated lecture, Professor Evan Pritchard, founder of the Center for Algonquin Culture will share insights collected over many years while walking the mountains surrounding Pine Hill and Esopus Creek. To illustrate the native history of these mountains, he will use landscape paintings by local artists and acknowledge the unspoken indigenous history behind each scene.



To help us understand the mysterious "cairns" (ceremonial stone piles) that cover the mountainsides, he will use maps, linguistics, oral tradition, astronomy, science, and a little archaeology to underscore their "message." This "message", as interpreted by Doug Harris, advisor to Overlook Mountain Center in Woodstock, and Retired Deputy Tribal Historic Preservation Officer for the Narragansett Tribe of Rhode Island is "to live in harmony and balance with nature and one other."This approach to oneness is the "one commandment" our ancestors set in stone on this land over three thousand years ago. Everything spoken since is a footnote.

## Governor Hochul Takes on Infant and Maternal Mortality Crisis

• Signs S.1867A/A.5435A to Create New York State Community Doula Directory, New Resource for

• Governor Urges Eligible New Yorkers to Enroll in Medicaid, Which Will Cover Doula Services Starting on January 1, 2024

York State Regional Perinatal Centers
• Newly-Released Federal Data Reveals Infant Mortality Rising In U.S. For The First Time In Two Decades; Maternal Mortality in U.S. Higher Than **European Nations** 

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced New York's latest effort to combat the maternal and infant mortality rates, as infant mortality rose nationwide for the first time in decades. Legislation S.1867A/A.5435A directs the New York State Department of Health to create and maintain a New York directory of doulas - birthing experts who provide physical, emotional and informational support before, during, and after the child-birthing experience. Governor Hochul also announced that doula services will be covered for all Medicaid enrollees starting on January 1, 2024. The governor also highlighted \$4.5 million in annual funding for Regional Perinatal Centers secured in the FY23 budget, which has been allocated by the New York State Department of Health.

"Our maternal and infant mortality rates are a disgrace," Governor Hochul said. "Expanding access to doula services is an effective, evidence-based strategy to support expectant parents and allow their babies to grow and thrive. As the first mom and grandma to serve as Governor of New York, I'm committed to doing everything in my

power to tackle the disturbing rise in infant mortality."

New York State Department of Health Commissioner Dr. James McDonald said, "The State Health Department remains committed to addressing the increased mortality rates among Black people who give birth. Doula services can improve birth outcomes and provide families with emotional support during a time that can be challenging. I stand with Governor Hochul to continue to fight for services that will ensure all people who give birth have a safe and empowering birthing experience."

**NOVEMBER 9, 2023** 

The Governor signed legislation S.1867/A.5435A, which requires the New York State Department of Health (DOH) to establish and maintain a state community doula directory on the DOH website for the purposes of Medicaid reimbursement. This piece of legislation will promote doula services to Medicaid recipients and establish criteria for admittance into the New York State community doula direc-

State Senator Samra Brouk said, "I'm grateful to Governor Hochul for her support of this legislation to create a Community Doula Directory. This bill will ensure that doula care is more accessible to families who need it and marks a crucial step forward in combating rising maternal mortality rates, especially for Black New Yorkers, who are five times more likely to die from a pregnancy related complication. I look forward to continuing to work alongside Governor Hochul, my partners in the legislature, and community doulas themselves to expand access to doula care in New York State. (Contd. Pg. 35)

Assemblymember Michaelle Solages said, "This bill is a significant step toward expanded access to doula care in New York State. Pregnant people of color, especially Black women, face disproportionately higher rates of pregnancy complications and maternal mortality. Doulas help combat this by providing low-cost support to birthing people. I commend Governor Hochul for signing this legislation, which will provide a centralized and accessible space for pregnant people to find the quality doula care that they need to have a positive birthing experience."

Additionally, Governor Hochul encourages eligible New Yorkers to enroll in Medicaid, which will cover doula services starting on January 1, 2024. Typically, the doula-client relationship begins a few months into a pregnancy (with the doula supporting the creation of the birth plan) and spans the pregnancy

and post-partum period.

In April 2018, DOH announced the New York State Doula Pilot Program, which provided Medicaid coverage for doula services to pregnant and postpartum people in Erie County, extending these services to many low-income residents for the first time. In this year's State Budget, Medicaid coverage for doula services was extended statewide, effective January 1, 2024.

Despite national data, New York State has made great strides in decreasing the rate of infant deaths and is currently ranked 4th in the nation for lowest infant mortality rates. However, racial and geographic disparities reflect national trends - with Black infants almost three times as likely to die as White infants. The statewide maternal mortality rate peaked at 24.1 per 100,000 live births from 2008-2010, and in response, DOH created the Maternal Mortality Review Initiative (MMRI) to systematically review all New York State maternal deaths and develop strategies and interventions to decrease the risk of these deaths. As a result of these measures, New York State improved significantly in national rankings.

The FY23 State Budget allocated \$4.5 million in annual funding to support the state's Regional Perinatal Centers (RPCs), which are hospitals that provide the highest level of perinatal and infant care and serve as coordinating entities over their networks of affiliated birthing centers. RPCs provide oversight of their networks to identify areas for improvement, like additional provider training or enhanced protocols. Funding supports RPCs across the state as they convene key stakeholders to foster collaboration and referral and discuss regionally relevant topics of interest.

Today's legislation, sponsored by Senator Brouk and Assemblymember Solages, will go further to keep pregnant people safe by creating a publicly accessible 'Doula Database' which would support the growing number of New York State doulas working with pregnant people and their families. According to the American Pregnancy Association, "studies have shown that having a doula as a member of the birth team decreases the overall cesarean rate by 50 percent, and the length of labor by 25 percent."

State Senator Cordell Cleare said, "I am thrilled the Governor is signing the Doula Directory Bill, which I proudly co-sponsor and which has been so effectively championed by Senator Brouk. Having access to the empowerment, support, understanding and experience of a doula is absolutely necessary for the physical, mental and emotional health of mother and child and it must be a baseline human right."

State Senator Lea Webb said, "We know that doulas facili-

tate safety and good health outcomes for all mothers, especially mothers of color both during birth and the postpartum period. This legislation will create a doula directory, which will improve equitable access to these health providers and help combat maternal health disparities and ensure healthy outcomes for more infants and mothers. I am proud, as Chair of the Senate's Women's Issues Committee, to have championed this bill, and I am grateful to my colleague, Senator Brouk, for her leadership on this issue. I thank Governor Hochul for demonstrating her commitment to maternal health by signing this legislation into law today."

## Governor Hochul Honors Veterans with Annual Free Fishing Day On Saturday Nov. 11, Freshwater Fishing License Requirement Waived for Residents and Non-Residents

Free Fishing Day is One of Many Ways New York State Recognizes and Assists Veterans and Active Duty Military in Connecting to the Outdoors

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced that New York will honor veterans on the year's sixth and final Free Fishing Day of 2023 on Saturday, Nov. 11. On Free Fishing Days, the state waives the requirement for a freshwater fishing license, offering the perfect opportunity for beginners to try out the sport for the first time or for skilled anglers to bring along friends and family to experience New York's world class waterways.

"Fishing is regarded as one of the most therapeutic outdoor activities, making it a perfect pastime for veterans, those currently serving in the military, and all New Yorkers looking to get outside and enjoy nature," Governor Hochul said. "The Empire State is home to some of the best freshwater fishing opportunities in the world, and on Free Fishing Day we waive the fees for anglers of all skill levels and abilities to explore our abundant lakes, river, and ponds."

New York's Free Fishing Days program began in 1991 to give those who might not fish the chance to try the rewarding sport at no cost and learn about a new hobby. During the Department of Environmental Conservation's (DEC) designated Free Fishing Days, residents and non-residents are permitted to fish in freshwater for free without a fishing license. While no license is required, all other freshwater fishing regulations remain in effect.

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Commissioner Basil Seggos said, "DEC and our partners are honored to extend this opportunity for New York's veterans and active military personnel to enjoy the outdoors with friends and family on Free Fishing Day this Saturday, November 11. I deeply appreciate all of those who have defended our nation's democracy and freedoms, and Free Fishing Day is a perfect time to cast a line and enjoy the stellar fishing opportunities New York State has to offer."

In addition to Free Fishing Days, there are other opportunities for veterans or active-duty military members to fish for free or at a reduced cost. New York State offers free/reduced fee fishing licenses for active-duty military members meeting certain criteria and for resident veterans with a service-related disability of 40 percent or more.

#### Governor Hochul Announces \$5 Million Available to Support Improvements to Animal Shelters During Animal Shelter Appreciation Week

Round Six of the Companion Animal Capital Fund Helps Animal Shelters Across the State with Construction, Renovation, and Expansion Projects Over \$33 Million Has Been Dedicated to the Program to Date, Supporting Better Care and Increased Adoptions for Dogs and Cats

Governor Kathy Hochul , during Animal Shelter Appreciation Week, announced \$5 million is available to support animal shelters and humane societies in making critical infrastructure upgrades at New York's animal shelters. This is the sixth round of funding dedicated to New York State's Companion Animal Capital Fund, the first state-funded program in the nation to provide for shelter improvement projects. Funded projects will enhance animal care at shelters and ultimately help to ensure increased adoptions for New York's dogs and cats.

"New York State's Companion Animal Capital Fund has made a real difference to shelters across the state and the animals in their care," Governor Hochul said. "I'm proud that the funding announced today will continue to build on the great work of this program, helping New York's animals stay happy and healthy as they await their forever homes."

Since the launch of the Companion Animal Capital Fund program in 2017, the state has dedicated over \$33 million to the program, including funds committed in this year's budget. In total, 84 projects have been awarded across New York so far.

Administered by the Department of Agriculture and Markets (AGM), the program provides matching grants to shelters and humane societies to offset the costs associated with capital projects, such as renovating dog kennels, improving medical facilities, or building more efficient shelters to reduce overall operational costs. Funds are also used to construct, renovate, rehabilitate, or acquire buildings or equipment needed to house, treat, and care for sheltered dogs and cats. AGM selects grant recipients based on a need assessment, detailed project description, and reasonableness of cost.

Two Requests for Proposals (RFPs) have been released through Round 6 of this program:

#### RFP 0311

Over \$3.5 million is available for municipal and incorporated not-for-profit pounds, shelters, humane societies, and rescue facilities. Eligible entities must be a pound or shelter for dogs established and maintained as outlined in section 114 of New York Agriculture and Markets Law.

#### RFP 0312

Over \$1.1 million is available for duly incorporated pounds, shelters, humane societies, or rescue facilities

that are not operated by or under contract with a municipality but that are registered with AGM, according to section 408 of New York Agriculture and Markets Law. Entities must demonstrate that they provide similar pound or shelter services in underserved municipalities or regions where there is insufficient shelter capacity for dogs and/or cats.

Applications are due by 4:00 pm on January 29, 2024.

New York State Agriculture Commissioner Richard A. Ball said, "Thanks to Governor Hochul and the legislature's continued support of the Companion Animal Capital Fund program, we can continue to help shelters make critical improvements that will ensure better conditions for the animals in their care. It has been great to tour some of the completed projects that this program has funded in recent years, and I look forward to seeing what exciting projects this round of funding will support."

State Senator Michelle Hinchey said, "The hardworking staff and volunteers at animal shelters and SPCAs throughout New York State provide loving care to animals as they wait to be adopted into their forever families. Thanks to the Companion Animal Capital Fund, we've seen needed upgrades and improvements made to many local facilities, enhancing the well-being of our shelter animals. I'm proud to have helped champion this program in the State Budget, and I'm grateful to Governor Hochul for extending another round of this important grant funding to our state's shelters."

Each year during the first full week of November, The Humane Society of the United States celebrates Animal Shelter Appreciation Week in honor of animal shelters and the dedicated people who work to protect the animals in their care.





#### It is Official - Ellenville Shoprite will be Closing

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





# Congressman Pat Ryan Brings the Social Security Administration Back to Ulster County with C.A.R.E.S. Van Event, Continues Push to Reopen Permanent Office

Representatives from community partners including the Alzheimer's Association, Senator Michelle Hinchey's office, and the Ulster County for the Aging will also be in attendance to provide in-person assistance

WASHINGTON, DC - Today, Congressman Pat Ryan announced that he is bringing assistance from the Social Security Administration back to Ulster County with an event with his Constituent Advocacy Resources Empowerment Services (C.A.R.E.S.) Van. The event will be held this Thursday, November 9, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Ulster County Restorative Justice and Community Empowerment Center located at 733 Broadway in Kingston. Staff from the Social Security Administration will join Congressman Ryan's caseworkers to answer questions and assist constituents with accessing their benefits.

"For too long, Ulster County seniors have gone without the critical services provided by a Social Security office. I hear from people all the time who aren't able to make the hour-plus drive to the nearest office, and can't get the help they need online," said Congressman Pat Ryan. "I'm proud to be bringing the Social Administration back to Ulster County to hear these concerns directly from our community, but our fight isn't done. I will keep pushing to restore the much-needed services provided by a permanent Social Security Office."

In March, Congressman Ryan wrote a letter to Acting Social Security Administration Commissioner Kilolo Kijakazi to demand the reopening of the Kingston Social Security Office and Congressman Ryan's staff has since held multiple meetings with Social Security Administration leaders to progress on the effort. The Social Security Administration's satellite office in the town of Ulster closed in 2018, leaving Ulster County residents in need of direct assistance traveling upwards of an hour to the nearest Social Security Office located in Poughkeepsie.

#### **Continuing to Stand With Israel**

This week, Republicans took multiple steps to reassure our alliance with Israel in this critical time of need. I supported several initiatives to aid Israel's effort to defend themselves and ensure American taxpayer dollars are never inadvertently used to fund and support terrorist organizations.

The Israel Security Supplemental Appropriations Act provides Israel with \$14.3 billion in much needed emergency funding for additional resources needed to defend itself against the horrific and unprecedented attacks by Hamas terrorists. Additionally, I led a letter to Cornell University in response to Cornell Professor Russell Rickford's comments that the invasion of Israel was "exciting" and "exhilarating." These heinous comments "demonstrate no regard whatsoever for humanity," as Cornell President Martha Pollack phrased it. I urge President Pollack to fire Professor Rickford immediately for his disgraceful behavior. You can read this letter here

Finally, you may be interested to know that I recently introduce the Countering Hate Against Israel by Federal Contractors Act. This bill would prohibit the federal government from using contractors that engage in or plan to engage in BDS campaigns. This bill builds off the laws of 38 states, including New York, which ban this practice at the state level.

Finally, President Biden's call for a military "pause" in Israel is dead wrong. A pause or ceasefire lets Hamas get away with the slaughtering, torturing, raping, and kidnapping of Americans and thousands of Israeli civilians. I strongly oppose any efforts by the Biden administration to pressure Israel into accepting a ceasefire or "pause". By calling for a pause, Biden is siding with Hamas & Iran instead of the fallen Americans and Israelis.

Responding to the Biden Administrations Repeated Attempts to Circumnavigate the Supreme Court With Student Loan Bailouts on Kudlow

Once again, the Biden Administration has attempted to circumnavigate Congress and the Supreme Court by bailing out billions of dollars in student loan debt. Broad debt forgiveness of the kind President Biden has proposed, especially forgiveness done unilaterally without congressional approval, will do nothing to lower the costs of education or to reform this broken system. I will continue to oppose any and all efforts by this administration to transfer hundreds of billions of taxpayer dollars to the wealthy beneficiaries of this democratic party cash grab. #### **Boosting American Energy Production and Cutting Wasteful Spending**

This week I voted on legislation that continues House Republicans' mission of cutting waste in the federal bureaucracy while funding vital programs in an efficient manner. H.R. 4821, the Interior and Environment Appropriations package, funds the Department of Interior and related agencies at a topline of \$25.417 billion, which is \$13.433 billion (35%) below the Fiscal Year 2023. This brings the fiscal allocations to below FY18 funding levels. This critical legislation protects hunting, fishing, and recreational activities, and includes pro-American energy policies that will unleash our energy independence. Among other things, this bill:

Cuts funding for programs that are unauthorized for FY24. Rescinds \$7.8 billion from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund created in the IRA.

Rescinds \$1.4 billion for Environmental and Climate Justice funding provided in the IRA.

Rescinds \$200 million designated by the Department of the Interior for the Presidio Trust in San Francisco.

Eliminates funding for climate change activities and programs

Prohibits funds for implementing DEI executive orders and offices, and prohibits funds to promote CRT.

Cuts funding for the EPA by 39%.

Additionally, this legislation promotes American energy security and competitiveness while continuing House Republican's efforts to lower energy costs across the board:

Requires oil and gas lease sales in the Central Gulf of Mexico, the Western Gulf of Mexico Planning Area, and in the Alaska region.

Requires the Secretary of the Interior to conduct quarterly onshore oil and gas lease sales.

Prohibits EPA from implementing permitting requirements for livestock emissions under the Clean Air Act.

Repeals the Biden Administration's Waters of the United States (WOTUS) regulation.

Expands access to critical minerals, reducing our domestic reliance on the Chinese supply chain.

Having now passed six of twelve appropriations bills, House Republicans will continue to uphold our promise to the American people to fund our government through regular order.

Democrat Primary Election Overturned After Ballot Stuffing Video Surfaced

#### **Imposing Vital Sanctions on Iran**

This week I supported the Stop Harboring Iranian Petroleum Act (SHIP) Act, which imposes sanctions on foreign ports and refineries that process petroleum exported from Iran in violation of U.S. sanctions. Revenue from oil sales provides significant resources to enable the Iranian regime to advance its nuclear program, continue its support for Hezbollah and other terrorist organizations, and continue its repression of the Iranian people. Since Joe Biden took office, Iran has made over \$80 billion from these illegal oil sails. Cutting off these streams of revenue will significantly impair Iran's ability to exhibit influence in the Middle Eastern region.

#### My Votes Explained

Transparency in Congress and a well-informed electorate are vital to preserving our self-governing Constitutional Republic. My constituents deserve to know how their members of Congress vote, which is why I have explained every vote I have cast in Congress since I was first elected.

- I voted "Yes" on H.R. 4821, the Interior and Environment Appropriations for Fiscal Year 2024, which provides funding for the Department of Interior and related agencies. The bill protects hunting, fishing, and recreational activities, and includes pro-American energy policy riders that will return the country back to energy independence. Among these policies, the bill repeal's the Biden Administration's illegal and vague Waters of the United States (WOTUS) regulation, which hinders our farmers and landowners with over burdensome regulations. The Bill also gives incentives for additional oil, gas, and mineral leases on federal lands to boost American energy production, reduce energy prices, and curb our reliance on China. Finally, the bill eliminates countless far left pet projects that distract the EPA and Department of Interior from its core responsibilities, responsibly managing our federal land and keeping our water and soil clean. This bill passed the House by a vote of 213-203.
- I voted "Yes" on H.Res. 798, Condemning the support of Hamas, Hezbollah, and other terrorist organizations at institutions of higher education, which may lead to the creation of a hostile environment for Jewish students, faculty, and staff. This resolution calls on campus administrators to condemn anti-Semitism and urges the enforcement of federal civil rights laws to protect Jewish students. Across the country, we have seen a sharp rise of anti-Semitism, particularly on college campuses. Institutions like Columbia, Cornell, Harvard, and SUNY Binghamton have had numerous incidents which have created a hostile environment for Jewish students. And just a few days ago, a Cornell student was arrested for inciting the killing ofJewish classmates. The administrators and chancellors of these universities must take urgent and decisive actions to protect students on these campuses and to condemn the horrific attack by U.S. designated terrorist organizations. I cosponsored this resolution and strongly supported its passage. This resolution passed the House by a vote of 396-23.
- I voted "Yes" on H.R. 3774, the Stop Harboring Iranian Petroleum Act. This bill would impose new sanctions on Iranian oil and make it the official policy of the United States to restrict Iranian oil exports. Under President Trump, the United States engaged in a "Maximum Pressure" campaign to restrict Iran oil sales, which are used to fund terrorism and oppress the Iranian

- people. However, President Biden has willfully not enforced these sanctions, and during his administration, Iran has sold over \$80 billion worth of oil mostly to China. These funds have directly contributed to the ongoing conflict in Israel, terrorism throughout the Middle East and abroad, and the oppression of the Iranian people. This critical legislation will work to crackdown on these illicit oil sales and cut off key funding for the brutal Iranian mullahs. This bill passed by a vote of 342-69.
- I voted "Yes" on H.R. 6126, the Israel Security Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2024. This bill provides \$14.3 billion of critical military assistance to Israel for defense of its sovereignty and from the brutal assault by Hamas which is fully offset by rescinding extra funds provided to the IRS by the Inflation Reduction Act. As our greatest ally in the Middle East continues to pursue justice for the Israeli and American civilians killed and kidnapped by Hamas, the United States must stand steadfast in its support of the Israeli people. Despite President Biden's calls for a massive \$100+ billion omnibus, I strongly supported considering Israel aid separately in a standalone measure. That is why I introduced a similar bill to H.R. 6126 called the "Operation Swords of Iron" Supplemental Appropriations Act. I was very disappointed that the overwhelming majority of my Democratic colleagues chose to oppose this commonsense package, but I was glad to see that 12 of them had the courage to break party lines and stand with Israel. I urge the Senate to quickly take up this piece of legislation so we can get this critical aid to Israel to support them in their fight. This legislation was adopted by a vote of 226-196.
- I voted "No" on the Motion to Table H. Res. 829, Censuring Representative Rashida Tlaib for antisemitic activity, sympathizing with terrorist organizations, and leading an insurrection at the United States Capitol Complex. This resolution would have censured Congresswoman Rashida Tlaib for supporting the attack by Hamas on Israel and her various anti-Semitic comments. Representative Tlaib has a long history of anti-Semitic and anti-Zionist comments, as well as a history of engaging in blood libel against the Jewish people. Congresswoman Tlaib has had a multitude of opportunities to apologize for her comments but has refused to do so. She deserves to be censured for these horrific comments which is why I voted against the motion to table. This motion passed the House by a vote of 222-186.
- · I voted "Yes" on H.Res. 559, Declaring it is the policy of the United States that a nuclear Iran is unacceptable. This resolution would officially make it U.S. policy that a nuclear Iran is unacceptable and that the United States must work proactively to prevent Iran from gaining nuclear weapons. As Iran continues to fund and support terrorism throughout the world and oppress its people, the United States must prevent Iran's attempts at creating a nuclear weapon, especially given Ayatollah Khomeini's vow to use it against Israel and the Jewish people. I was honored to be a cosponsor of this resolution and support its passage on the floor. This bill passed the House by a vote of 354-53.
- I voted "Yes" on H.R. 340, the Hamas International Financing Prevent Action. This bill would impose sanctions on Hamas, the Palestinian Islamic Jihad Al-Aqsa Martyrs Brigade, the Lion's Den, or any affiliate or successor thereof, as well as on states which provide them support. As terrorist groups continue to violently attack Israel and target civilians, the United States must do everything in its power to cutoff support for these groups. The Biden administration has been weak in enforcing sanctions against Iran and its partner and proxy groups, and we have seen the grave consequences that come with this weakness. This bill would finally impose harsher sanctions on Hamas, Palestinian Islamic Jihad, and other terrorist groups in the same way that Congress imposed sanctions on Hezbollah in the past. This bill passed the House by a vote of 363-46.

I voted "Yes" on H.R. 4364, the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2024. This bill funds the Legislative Branch at \$262.9 million less than in Fiscal Year 2023, and over \$400 million less than the President's budget request. This bill is a perfect example of the House Republican majority's commitment to reining in wasteful government spending and restoring fiscal sanity to Washington. This bill abolishes the Office of Diversity and Inclusion, and bans any Critical Race Theory or Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion education. It also prohibits any closure of tours, except for security reasons, ensuring the people's branch remains open and accessible to Americans. Additionally, the bill maintains the freeze on Member pay, and requires any unspent funds to be used for debt and deficit reduction. After the passage of this appropriations bill, the House of Representatives has now passed 5 of the 12 appropriations bills, while the Senate has still yet to pass any individual spending bills. House Republicans will continue working to fund the government through regular order, while cutting wasteful government spending. This bill passed the House by a vote of 214-197.

I voted "No" on H. Res. 773, Providing for the expulsion of Representative George Santos from the House of Representatives. This resolution would have expelled Representative George Santos from the House of Representatives and required a 2/3 majority to pass. While the allegations against Representative Santos are deeply concerning and potentially criminal, he has yet to be afforded the due process to which all American citizens are entitled. The House Ethics Committee and judicial system are actively investigating Congressman Santos, and Congress should not expel him until we receive the results of these investigations and prosecutions. This resolution is premature and would erode the critical due process that I swore an oath to uphold. This motion failed to pass by a vote of 179-213

## Molinaro Introduces Bipartisan Legislation to Identify Hamas Supporters within U.S. Government

Washington, DC - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (R-NY-19) today introduced bipartisan legislation to identify Hamas supporters in the U.S. government. The bill was authored in response to reporting that found a Department of Homeland Security official previously served as a spokesperson for the Palestine Liberation Organization and created numerous obscene, antisemitic, and pro-Hamas social media posts. Rep. Molinaro introduced the bill with U.S. Rep. Josh Gottheimer (D-NJ-5).

Specifically, Rep. Molinaro's legislation requires Inspector Generals in the Department of Defense (DOD), State Department, Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI), and Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) to submit a report to Congress with a list of employees who have ties to or have shown support for Hamas.

Rep. Molinaro said, "We cannot afford to have Hamas sympathizers within our government, especially in roles that manage our crucial relationship with Israel. This bipartisan legislation aims to uphold the highest standards of accountability and transparency, safeguarding our institutions from any association with terrorist organizations like Hamas. America's support for Israel during its time of need demands that we take decisive action to root out potential threats within our government."

Rep. Gottheimer said, "Hamas terrorists have brutally murdered thousands of innocent lives, including dozens of Americans, and Hamas leaders have openly admitted in reference to October 7 that 'there will be a second, a third, a fourth' wave of violence in Israel. This bipartisan legislation takes strong, commonsense action to root out Hamas terrorist sympathizers. Hamas is designated by the United States as a Foreign Terrorist Organization. Supporters of terrorists serving within our government puts our national security at risk."
